So as the seasons change and spring moves forward and flowers finally begin to flourish, UUCC remains the deep, endless, blue sky... everything else, it's just the weather.







Faith

In last month's newsletter Gy wrote about love. I submitted an article about hope. So what about Faith? And is faith the same as belief or are they different? Are they connected?

A bit of "google search" gave this definition of belief: "An opinion or judgement in which a person is fully persuaded." This definition assumes the

person reads, studies, listens to others and basically gathers enough evidence to be "fully persuaded." One would at least hope that is true.

So what is faith? One definition is that faith is a firm belief in something for which there is no proof. While belief assumes there is at least some empirical evidence, that definition of faith suggests there needs to be no evidence whatsoever. I found this explanation of faith to be unsatisfactory.

A further google search suggested that faith is composed of three critical elements. One of those elements is belief. Now this was beginning to making a bit more sense.

Additional reading and "google searching" suggested that belief is just the beginning of faith which has additional elements. Faith begins with a belief but then it must be rooted in absolute confidence. Then if that absolute confidence is very strong, it will result in action. When a belief takes action, only then is it considered faith. In other words, <u>Faith</u> is a strong <u>Belief</u> where <u>Confidence</u> in that belief brings about an <u>Action</u>.

So, faith and belief are interrelated. Faith begins with a belief. The more confident we are in that belief, the more likely there is to be action.

If faith begins with a belief, then it becomes necessary to challenge our minds to find the truth. The more firmly we are convinced of a truth, the more confident we become. If you want your actions to reflect your faith, then is becomes necessary to be confident in what you believe. Confidence in what you believe comes from knowledge. It comes from reading, studying and listening to diverse points of view.

Our faith is rooted in <u>seven Principles</u>. This is a faith where open mindedness is foundational. We seek the truth. We seek it in books. We seek it in open dialog. We not only seek the truth, but we are prepared to change our belief and our actions based on the truths we uncover as we move along on our path of searching.

How fortunate we are to have discovered and to walk with other seekers. How fortunate we are to know we don't have the answers to life's questions. How fortunate we are to find joy in asking the questions and being comfortable with not knowing the answers. How fortunate we are to continually share our thoughts, explore our diversity, study the great thoughts of writers and profound leaders who have given us works, words ,and examples for life. How fortunate we are that our faith is one that leads us to act with confidence.

This is our Faith. And I am proud to be among those who inspire me to learn more, study more, read more, be more so I can give more of myself to others. This is a faith I hold with absolute confidence.

Board Briefs

April 10, 2019

Four Board members were present. One member was absent due to illness. Rev. Gy was also in attendance. The following are highlights of this meeting:

- Proposed annual budget was approved for presentation to the congregation. The budget will be presented on May 5th (note change of date) for discussion and on May 19th at the annual meeting for approval by voting members.
- The Board's annual report was briefly reviewed with suggestions offered. Other Committees have been asked to submit their annual reports. All annual committee reports will be gathered, collated and copied. Each member household will receive one copy of these reports at the annual meeting. In the past, these reports have been filed with no distribution or posting. It is the sentiment of the Board that this is an opportunity for the congregation to recognize the accomplishments of each committee.
- A revision to the By-laws reducing the number of members to the Nominating Committee from 3 members to two members was reviewed and approved for presentation and approval by the members at the annual meeting.
- Nancy Calme and Betty Lee Ongley were appointed to serve on a Special Nominating Committee. Their role will be to identify an individual to fill a vacant position on the Nominating Committee for FY 2019-20.
- It was approved by the Board to offer the position of DRE to Miriam Epscamp. Contract
 negotiations will be completed by the HR Committee. Miriam will begin on the 2nd Sunday in
 May.
- The proposal to replace our copier with one that is more efficient and less costly was approved. The current copier contact ends June 30th. Kimberly Ridley was recognized for her excellent research and clearly documented proposal.
- The request to approve the application for a 24 hour liquor license for a dance to be held on Friday, May 31st was approved.
- An updated policy and fee structure for renting our facility was approved.
- Denise Sonier was recognized for coordinating the volunteers helping our refugee family.
- The next meeting of the Board of Trustees will be on May 8th at 2:00 at the Church.

PLEASE NOTE: The proposed annual budget, revision to the ByLaws and the nominees to the Board of Trustees and the Nominating Committee will be posted/distributed for the congregation's review prior to the Annual Meeting according to our bylaws. UUCC members are invited to be informed and prepared to participate fully at the Annual Meeting scheduled for May 19th after Sunday Services. Your Board of Trustees is working diligently to assure communication is open, timely and complete.
