Hello! My name is Laura Ray. I am native to Michigan and have lived in the Lansing area for more than 30 years. I have been with my husband for 30 years and we have been married for 13 years. I have 5 children and 12 grandchildren.

I have been a member of UU Lansing for 9 years. I currently serve on the Board as well as Co-Chair of Stone Soup (economic equity group). I participate in Stewardship, Inclusion & Diversity, 1st Principle, and Accessibility Groups.

I have been disabled in one way or another for most of my life. One of my grown children grew up autistic, and then as a young adult we found out he has acromegaly and a brain tumor. I have been an advocate in the mental health industries for most of his childhood years. I more recently have worked as a guardian for disabled adults, and I currently am advocating for accessibility in the church because I do not always look disabled, I have good and bad days. I have found that seems harder for people to understand things they can't see, and it has given me the fire I need to fight the good fight.



Stay Committed to Using Less Energy

Did you know there are 129 light fixtures in the Religious Education area at UCC? And that most of them get turned on every Sunday and burn from 9:00 AM until after noon? That must be using quite a bit of electricity! The kids at UCC discovered this information during their first Social Justice Sunday of the year on

September 29 when they were invited to brainstorm ways to combat Climate Change and live up to the 7th UU Principle which reminds us to take care of planet Earth. They decided that the one thing they could do in the fight against climate change is to help raise awareness about the importance of our continued commitment to reducing our energy use in our homes and at church. Reducing our energy use helps curb climate change by decreasing power plant emissions which are a major source of greenhouse gasses in atmosphere. The kids agreed to talk to people about this during coffee hour, to speak up during announcements one Sunday, and to put something in the newsletter about it. They would like to remind all of us to 1) Use few lights whenever we can 2) Turn off lights when we aren't using them 3) To purchase the most energy efficient light bulbs we can and 4) Consider installing sensors that will automatically turn off lights when not in use.

Board President's Corner

Remember me explaining the Board's concern that our volunteers are so wrapped up doing the critical church tasks that there is little space to try the exciting additional projects we want to do?

On September 21, a group of about twenty congregants gathered to discuss just that. Let me tell you what we came up with.

First, we reviewed the committees, task forces, work groups, and individuals that get the work done today, and everyone put marks where they participate. There were lots of check marks, most people having multiple jobs. We took a stab at lining up these groups and jobs in an organized manner by who "reports" to whom – to the Board, to Program Council, or stand-alone functions.

Then we took a step back and shouted out the cool things we wish we could do if we only had the time and excess energy. This generated a range of feelings from excitement to wistfulness to just being overwhelmed. What if we could pry loose some of that energy tied up in the committee meetings, minutes, and long-standing routine and redirect it into a few of the things on the wish list?

Eric Nelson told us about how the Building and Grounds Team has transformed itself and begun tackling so much more than before. Number one, they only meet four times a year. The first meeting is to identify and choose projects, prioritizing them based on urgency and budget. They set a timeline for task completion and assign a task leader/point person for each. Then they set them loose to get going on it.

This includes calling for help via announcements and signup sheets and sharing information with the congregation about what is going on. Every four months, they gather again to assess the progress on these goals and review the budget to see where adjustments need to be made.

This model could be applied to the Sunday Services, Connections, and Faith in Action committees. The goal-setting meeting at the beginning will identify critical tasks that need to be continued and lofty projects that stretch the imagination. Individuals have the freedom to accept leadership on the projects they care the most about, and if no one feels moved enough to take on a project, it may be set aside until it is ripe for the picking. The periodic follow up meetings, calls for help when needed, and communication are all necessary but will take up a lot less time in this new model.

The Program Council plays a big role in this. It is the ideal place to talk through the great ideas on the wish list, gauge the level of interest, invite others to pitch in, and celebrate our accomplishments. I encourage everyone to participate in these meetings. It is where we can harness that mighty energy that appears like magic when our congregation is "woke."

I have been the person who deals with building rentals for several years. We currently have a couple of regular once-a-year renters (The National Belly Dancing event – scheduled for October 19 – and Life Line Screening – scheduled for November 9) and a wedding on December 14.



Our policy calls for someone from the church being in attendance to open and close the building. For groups like the belly dancers, whom I trust, I have skirted the rules and loaned them a key to use – since I could not show up all the time to meet their needs.

The Board has asked that we no longer loan keys because of possible insurance issues. AND – I cannot be at the Belly Dancers event in October. We need up to 4 volunteers to open and close the church for them (they pay \$500 for the church for one day).

The Belly Dance group will arrive at 8:00 AM Saturday, October 19 and finish very late Saturday night – around midnight. – as they reset the church for Sunday. PLEASE consider volunteering for one of these times. Let Miriam or me know if you would be willing and which time you can be here.

In the future, when someone wants to rent our building we will need to arrange for volunteers to open and close the building before we sign a contract to rent. It would be nice to have a list of people to call on if needed. If you would be willing to be part of the open/close team for building rentals in the future, please let me know.



R.E.flections

From [Miriam Epskamp](#), Director of Religious Education (DRE)

After more than a year of study, writing, and review, the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) has recently released new Youth Safety Guidelines and I have been spending a lot of my free time lately reviewing them and trying to figure out how our very small congregation can implement them. At the heart of the UUA's recommendations is a desire that everyone involved with our youth will take their physical, emotional, and sexual safety very seriously and work to create safe, intentionally inclusive spaces where youth can explore their minds, bodies, spirits and the whole of their identities without fear of harassment or abuse. Adopting the guidelines will require a commitment to more rigorous training and more thorough vetting of staff and volunteers. It will require reassessing what we do and how we do it make sure that our practices and our facilities are truly inclusive. For a small church with an even smaller RE program it will be a challenge. Fortunately our friends at the UU MidAmerica Region have put together some webinars to assist DREs in understanding the major changes coming and helping small congregation devise strategies to overcome the stumbling blocks. During October, I will take part in two of these webinars and attend a face-to-face meeting with other Religious Education professionals in Michigan to help me better understand the guidelines and work through some of the questions I and others might have about them. In the coming months, I will share what I have learned with Rev. Gy and members of the Board of Trustees. There may also be discussions with kids, parents, and the larger congregation about how to move forward. Although there may be a few growing pains as there always is when things change, I am sure we will be able overcome any difficulties that arise if continue to make doing our very best for our kids a priority.

Health Screenings Coming to UUCC

Life Line Screening, a leading provider of community-based preventive health screenings, is pleased to offer a preventive health event at Unitarian Universalist Community Church on November 9.

Five screenings will be offered that scan for potential health problems related to: blocked arteries which is a leading cause of stroke; abdominal aortic aneurysms which can lead to a ruptured aorta; hardening of the arteries in the legs which is a strong predictor of heart disease; atrial fibrillation or irregular heart beat which is closely tied to stroke risk; and a bone density screening, for men and women, used to assess the risk of osteoporosis.
