REVOLUTION

A Revolutionary Year

As we approach the end of the church year, the Sunday Services Committee is reflecting on the past year. It was certainly a challenging year for several reasons. Because of COVID-19, we had to pivot to virtual services. While not ideal, this did come with opportunities to experience services that would have otherwise been outside our means or abilities to present.

We started the year by recognizing the birth of our nation with a look at the consequences of slavery and how it still impacts our nation by viewing 'The 1619 Project' by the New York Times. Then Rev. Gy introduced our theme for this year, REVOLUTION, and how we could use this theme to explore a variety of Unitarian Universalist spiritual practices.

As summer, and the pandemic, was in full swing we explored The Rule of St. Benedict with Rev. Canon William Spaid to see how a 6th-century guide to living in community can apply today. Then we heard from two former members of our youth group, Adel and Tess Johnson, to hear how the pandemic is impacting the delivery of social services and studying abroad and how this may affect us as we return to normal.

Stacey Ledbetter and Sholanna Lewis taught us about policing, incarceration, and how the revolution to change in these areas starts with us working to heal our community. Marcus Winchester shared how the Pokagon Band of Potawatomi Indians used ingenuity to avoid being uprooted by the 1830 Indian Removal Act. Laura Randall, from the UU Service Committee, kicked off our successful 'Guest at Your Table' campaign with a recorded sermon. River Artz-Iffland talked about Coming Out and opportunities for growth. Darby Fetzer told us about courageous conversations and Rev. Larry Farris gave us firsthand insight into revelations from the murder of George Floyd.

Rev. Harold Beu shared a thoughtful sermon series based on the Serenity Prayer. We celebrated the Winter Solstice with a lovely service led by Miriam Epskamp with participation from several of our members featuring words and music as a guide from Darkness to Light.

J. Barrett Lee welcomed the New Year with a message exploring the possibilities of a meaningful life in the midst of chaos. Donna Odom looked deeper at the roots of racism and what we can do to start healing. Wendy Fields taught us the origins of the NAACP chapter in Kalamazoo and its impact. We watched a truly inspiring recorded message by Brittany Packnett from the UUA Ware Lecture series. Kimberly Ridley led a discussion by members highlighting the important civic responsibility of jury duty. Dr. Melanie Davis honored 20 years of UU's Our Whole Lives sex education program. Dr. Michelle Johnson talked about Kalamazoo locations with significant layers of cultural empowerment.

Erin Augustine was with us again during our Earth Day celebration and was joined by members inspired by her to form our own Sustainability group. Rev. Erin Walter told us how we can endure feelings of isolation while embracing moments of love and joy with words and music in her service 'No Feeling is Final'. As the pandemic closed live music venues, we were able to virtually visit the homes of several talented performers who would otherwise have been out of our reach: the duo Stowegood, Tret Fure, Daniel Nahmod and our Music Director, Nick Sienkiewicz.

Throughout the year Rev. Gy has kept us focused on our theme of Revolution by addressing the subthemes suggested by our committee, Willingness, Inspiration, Courage, Curiosity, Oppression, Trust, Diversity, Love, Compassion, Community, Hope, Grief, Tradition, and Celebration.

The Sunday Services committee was pleased with the diversity and quality of services we were able to provide during this Revolutionary year. FROM THE MINISTER



From the Minister Rev. Gy Ludvig-McCartney

A few days ago a friend of mine died. He and his partner had been together for 52 years!!! What a heartbreaking loss. Tom can hardly remember life before Don. The funeral was held in the Unity church parking lot. Naturally, I attended.

This is the first time since Covid that I attended a larger gathering (not including a couple of Black Lives Matter rallies). I knew a lot of the people in attendance as they were either friends we had in common or are members of the Unity church where I also used to attend. It was mostly a group of friends and acquaintances, as well as

some people I never met.

Let me preface this story by stating that I am an extrovert. Here is something from the Web: "Do you love meeting new people? Does a big social event leave you feeling energized and renewed? If you can answer yes to these questions, then there is a possibility that you might be an extrovert". Yes, and yes!

Then why was I filled with anxiety the entire time I was at this funeral? I have always been outgoing, have always loved being around people yet something was different this time. I cannot say that I have a definitive answer why I had all this anxiety, but I can take a stab at it:

- Covid has changed our social landscape and I may have gotten too used to either being alone or being with just a very limited number of people at any time.
- Perhaps in the course of these nearly two years I've become more introverted (it can happen).
- The CDC has changed the rules around mask-wearing and many ditched their masks and perhaps
 I was negatively affected by it.

While Covid has surprised us time and again, current trends indicate that we are likely to return to our church building in the near future. On the extremes, to some it couldn't happen soon enough, while others are experiencing tremendous anxiety, with a variety of feelings in the middle.

Returning to our physical building may not be as easy as we once would have anticipated. We are complex beings and separation of such length has affected us in ways we may not be aware of. I certainly would not have expected to experience anxiety by attending a funeral. I wasn't even officiating, I was only in attendance. I knew most of the people and I like them all. I am baffled by my reaction. I still haven't been able to pinpoint the reason. Pre-Covid this just never happened. If anything, I would have been looking forward to catching up with some folks I rarely get to see. Not this time.

I suspect my experience is not going to be unique.

When we do return to in-person meetings, let us be sensitive and perceptive to our own needs. For some of us, this isolation functioned as a hard reset and perhaps this is what it took for us to realize what our true preferences are. It is okay to allow for change. It is okay to honor a shift in likes and dislikes. Your church leadership welcomes you to speak into your needs and we will do our very best to accommodate you.

When we do return to in-person meetings, let us be sensitive to each other. Allow for changes in boundaries in the other, allow for shifts in likes and dislikes in the other. They, too, have been changed by this experience. It is my hope and wish that we won't take these changes personally.

Some of us may want to maintain a virtual presence way into the future and we ought to make that possible as well. I suspect that we are going to maintain and strengthen a robust virtual presence going forward. It is the way of the future.

As we are preparing to return to our physical building, may we walk gently and kindly with each other. Just like one can never step in the same river twice, we, too, have been changed. One thing, however, remains – the LOVE and COMMITMENT we feel for this community and one another. I know that that very LOVE will guide us in our coming together and in our new ways of being.

And so it is.

Last year more than 10,000 screens tuned in to watch the Sunday Morning Worship at GA! UU Community Church will be sharing the service via Zoom on **Sunday**, **June 27**, **2021**, at **10:00 AM**. We encourage YOU to be part of this year's largest Sunday morning gathering of Unitarian Universalists by participating in this wonderful, communal event. We will not be live streaming the service to Facebook but will share the link to the Unitarian Universalist Association's YouTube channel for those who cannot join us on Sunday morning.

COVID TASK FORCE

Re-Opening Forum—June 15 at 7 PM

UUCC Covid Task Force was formed to monitor public health data and best practices in order to reopen the church in a way that balances public health, church liability, the need for community, and inclusion.

Members of the task force are Pat Fuehr, Judy Oliver and Steve Tasko. The group is reviewing the existing documents from the Board of Trustees on building use and Covid 19 protection during the pandemic. Also monitored are UUA documents and public health statistics pertinent to Covid 19.

As you may be aware the CDC guidelines have dramatically changed in the last weeks. The task force needs your input on opening the church in a responsible, yet inclusive manner.

As you reflect, consider the following questions:

- What have you learned about the church experience in the last year?
- What principles do you believe are at the center of our congregation?
- What challenges did you as an individual, or church participant, overcome in the last year?
- How would you like the church experience to look going forward?

A special Zoom meeting will be held on **Tuesday, June 15** at **7:00 PM** to give everyone an opportunity to share their thoughts on this important issue.

A Conversation with a Drag Queen

Drag is a performance art that can inspire creative thinking, break down stereotypes, and allow us to see traditional concepts of male and female differently.

Drag queens and drag kings are performers who offer exaggerated, performative presentations of gender and often cross-dress performatively. Cross-dressing and drag are not necessarily tied to erotic activity or sexual orientation. Though it is true that some drag queens are transgender women, the majority of drag queens are cisgender and take part in the art form because it offers them a creative outlet.

A conversation with a drag queen will be a unique opportunity for us to learn more about this important part of LGBTQ+ culture and to build bridges of understanding. If we are unable to schedule this gathering in June we will try to get it on the calendar later in the year.



There will be no regular Sunday Services at UU Community Church during the month of July. Please use the time away to rest and recharge. Regular services will resume on August 1.






