## April 2: *Perfect is the Enemy* with Rev. Gy

Voltaire famously wrote, "perfect is the enemy of good." Join Rev. Gy as they help us consider how the very idea of 'the best' prevents us from living wholeheartedly.

Our monthly spiritual themes in this year of <u>Widening the Circle</u> have been taken from a report by the Unitarian Universalist Association Commission for Institutional Change which was tasked with addressing the perennial problem of racism within Unitarian Universalism. - Newer generations expect to see a diversity of voices represented at church as well as a multicultural competency that is the norm in schools and workplaces.

Question to ponder this month: How can UUCC creatively respond to these changes in a way that will help us build a Beloved Community that benefits us all?

# GUESTS IN THE PULPIT

#### We are excited to welcome these guests to UU Community Church in April:

Michael Wilder was born and raised in Chicago and currently serves as the Group Violence Intervention Coordinator for the City of Kalamazoo. Michael did not always seem destined for such a prestigious title. Try Career Criminal instead. After three trips to prison, his future was as bleak as the desert. However, God had a different plan for him. After his last release from prison he enrolled in college and graduated from Kalamazoo Valley Community College with a degree in Political Science and the rest is history! Michael is a man of God, a devoted husband to his beautiful wife Dominque, and a father to his children. He is also an educator at Covenant Acad-



emy in Kalamazoo. He co-founded **Peace During War** with Yafinceio Harris. It is an organization that helps youth find their purpose and turn their experiences in the streets into something positive. Yafinceio and Michael were once rival enemies in the streets, but they now run an organization together, doing awesome and healing work in our community.



Originally from South Haven, **Shane Barrera** lived and worked in Kalamazoo as an HIV/STI prevention advocate before relocating to Grand Rapids (with a few years in Phoenix in between). Shane, performing as Miss Moscato, was crowned Miss Amateur Kalamazoo 2019, Miss Amateur Red Ribbon 2019, and Kalamazoo Queen of Hearts 2020. They now performs regularly at drag shows all across the country. Shane believes that drag "brings self-confidence, especially to people in the LGBTQ community" and is a unique way to advocate for issues. They use the platform to help fight the stigma of HIV/AIDS and to support women's rights and Black lives.

For our Thoughtful Thursday conversation on **April 27** at **7:00 PM** via Zoom, we will be joined by a representative of <u>Michigan Liberation</u>, an organization dedicated to achieving peace, wellness, and justice for the Black and Brown communities in Michigan.



Michigan Liberation is the driving force behind the *Michigan Black Mama's Day Bailout* initiative. This is an annual program held during May and June to coincide with Mother's Day. It not only provides

help with cash bail (a discriminatory practice that essentially criminalizes poverty) but it raises awareness about the need for criminal justice reform, and gives space for action to those directly impacted. We hope you will join us to learn more about the work Michigan Liberation is doing and how we can partner with them to effect change.

I have hope now. Hope that we explore new potentials for our beloved community even as I embark on yet another healing trip to LA. Hope for me, hope for us.

Maybe you can feel it, too. I would like you to. There's so much goodness here that can touch and heal the untouchables, the broken, and the lost. There's so much goodness here that with every touch, it grows bigger, stronger, wiser. Love built this place, love shall breathe future into it. Your love. Our love.

25 years ago we might not have been clear why this place was needed. Today we're wiser, more seasoned, and we now know that we're here to be a beacon of light and love. We're here, because every now and then we can see what others can't.

Here's to life, honesty, fight for what's right and just. And glory and hallelujah.

**Generosity Sunday** Our Generosity Sunday recipient for the month of April will be the **Kalamazoo Alliance to Prevent Gun Violence (KAP)**. KAP is an initiative of H.O.P.E Thru Navigation, an organization that provides wraparound navigation services and support to individuals with substance use disorder, criminal history, and/or facing housing insecurity. KAP's goal is to empower youth, women, and men who have been impacted by gun violence to break the cycle of trauma and violence. KAP produces a resource guide to provide support to those struggling with the impact of gun violence. They work with community partners such as ISAAC, Urban Alliance, Douglass Community Association, Vine Neighborhood Association, and others to present events that raise awareness about the impact of gun violence and provide opportunities for youth to have safe, healthy, educational, and productive options while not in school. As gun violence has recently surpassed car crashes as the leading killer of American children, supporting KAP seems more important than ever. If it is yours to do, there are several ways to give. ## RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION



**R.E.flections** From Miriam Epskamp, Director of Religious Education Work continues on *Drag Me to Church*, an all-ages drag event at UU Community Church on Saturday, May 20. From the very beginning, ensuring that everyone—the audience, the performers, and church volunteers—stays safe at this event has been a major consideration for me, Rev. Gy, the Board of Trustees, and even Nick. We all have seen news reports. We understand there is a "backlash" going on right now against drag shows that is fueled by social media, special interest groups, and rightwing legislators. We know by hosting a drag show that we could be inviting negative attention to our community.

So, we reached out to OutFront Kalamazoo and ask for a meeting with Program Manager, Dell Darnell to discuss our show and get some guidance about safety and security. The folks at OutFront were the perfect people to ask for help. They have lots of experience putting on fabulous events and also, sadly, lots of experience dealing with homophobia and hate.

Nick and I and our collaborator from Open House Theatre, Mary Roscoe, had an opportunity last month to sit down with Dell (over Zoom) and talk. The first thing we learned is that dozens of drag shows going on without incident every month in the greater Kalamazoo area. They are held in Galesburg, out in Richland, over in Oshtemo, and elsewhere. Our friends at Peoples Church even hosted a drag show on a Sunday morning during their worship service and no one batted an eye! Dell believes that for the most part, Kalamazoo County is tolerant of drag shows and it is unlikely that our event will draw a protest.

Unlikely does not mean it isn't possible though and Dell agreed we should consider the range of possible disruptive scenarios and make plans for how we will deal with them. Once we have drawn up some plans, Dell will look over what we came up with and provide feedback and suggestions. They also offered the help of a group of people in OutFront's network who have been trained in self-defense and de-escalation techniques. This group would be willing to provide security for us during the event.

OutFront's support of our little drag show has made us feel a lot more confident. I will be working with the board over the next few weeks to draw up a comprehensive security plan that will help us know what to do if we face any disruptions because of the drag show.

All this talk of safety, security, and self-defense may be leading some of you to question whether a drag show is too risky of a proposition for UUCC. Should we be drawing attention to ourselves like this? I think it is important to remember why we decided to do this in the first place to find our answer.

We are holding a drag show to visible, public support the LGBTQ+ community. Despite the advancements society has made over the past few decades, LGBTQ+ folks still face prejudice, bullying, threats, and even violence just for being who they are. For the LGBTQ+ community, drag shows are about pride, acceptance, and breaking down stigmas. And, they might even save people's lives.

According to the Trevor Project, LGBTQ+ youth are more than four times more likely to attempt suicide than their peers. LGBTQ+ youth are not inherently prone to suicide risk because of their sexual orientation or gender identity but rather are placed at higher risk because of how they are mistreated and stigmatized in society.

When we fly our rainbow flag, when we speak up for LGBTQ+ equality, we are throwing a lifeline to people who may be isolated and struggling. It could be that for someone out there, a welcoming drag show in a church may be just the sort of vibrant, joyful, glamourous, countercultural demonstration they need to know that it is OK for them to be different. It is OK for them to be who they are. For me, knowing that we are making things better for people who are hurting makes it worth any risk we might face. I hope you feel that way too.



### Finding Joy Through a Smaller Environmental Foot Print

The UUCC Sustainability Group meets on the third Monday of each month to reflect on their personal sustainability journeys, to share their successes and failures, and to explore ideas for promoting sustainable living at UUCC and in the wider community. April is a busy time for the group and they are working on several projects:

*Green Sanctuary 2030:* The Green Sanctuary Program is a Unitarian Universalist Association accreditation process for congregations interested in engaging in climate justice work. The program is designed to guide congregations through a process of education, opportunity assessment, and discernment that produces an action plan composed of activities and projects for campaigns that address three goals: Mitigation, Adaptation and Resilience, and Justice. The Sustainability Group is currently working on the opportunity assessment that will help us create an action plan that is tailored to the needs and capabilities of our congregation.

**30-Day Sustainability Challenge:** The group plans to run the 30-Day Sustainability Challenge again this year. Emails will go out to UUCC members and friends each Saturday morning between April 22 and May 20 that are full of things to read, listen to, watch, and do that will inspire you to live more gently on the Earth. **Rain Garden:** Now that the snow has melted, we have noticed some erosion in the Rain Garden we planted last fall. This was not totally unexpected. Hopefully, as the native plants become more established and do a better job of capturing run-off, erosion will become less of a problem. When the weather warms up, the group will plan a workday to address the issues.

**Vegetarian Feast 2023:** To highlight the many delicious ways we can fight climate change by incorporating vegetarian and vegan meals into our diet, the group will again hold a Vegetarian Feast this spring. 




Whether David Grann is investigating a mysteri-

### 8TH PRINCIPLE



### **Putting Our 8th UU Principle into Action**

Our newly adopted 8th UU Principle calls on us to engage in individual and communal action to accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves, our congregation, and society at large.

The work to dismantle racism recently showed up in our efforts to combat climate change. The Sustainability Group has been working to complete a survey that will help us get certified as a Green Sanctuary by the Unitarian

Universalist Association. One of the questions was: Research and identify any historic moments when systemic oppression was locked in for people of color in your area. Examples include redlining, sundown towns or counties, abrogation of treaties with indigenous people, or pervasive repression of voting rights. This process will further your understanding of systemic racism in your region.

This prompted one of the people in the group to ask, What does this have to do with sustainability? The answer is that racial and economic equity are fundamental to achieving sustainability goals that fight climate change and create a healthy world where all can thrive. The UUA website explains it this way:

The climate-change crisis with Global Warming is the existential threat to the human species and the web of life. It is the urgent, overarching survival and justice issue of our time, calling us to impactful action now.

In an era in which the call to dismantle racism could not be more clear, and when the COVID-19 pandemic stunningly highlights that systemic racism is inextricably bound to climate degradation and injustice, Unitarian Universalist Faithful Response calls us to bring our individual and collective gifts together to act with bold, inspiring, collaborative, networked, and effective leadership to ensure a livable world for all descendants and create climate justice with those who are systemically oppressed.

Climate action and climate justice call us to mitigate (reduce) climate change, along with better adaptation (coping) and increasing resilience (ability to adapt) to increasingly disastrous climate impacts. It calls us to balance urgency with open minds and hearts to learn and collaborate with communities most impacted. The result will be a difficult but creative and exciting transition to a clean renewable world with opportunity, survivability, and justice for all, now and for future generations.
