I am the first one to have earned a Masters Degree in my family. The second Masters degree I earned in the US. While I always wished myself to the US, I never actually believed that I'd make it here. Look at me now!

You may wonder why am I reflecting on my life right now? Here's why: next weekend is Gay Pride in Kalamazoo, June being Pride month around the world. I am going to attend Pride representing a CHURCH as a minster, as a GAY minister!!! Think about that!

When I first became a minister, I was closeted and certain that I was heading to Hell. Now I am married to a woman, no longer headed to hell and ministering an awesome church!!! This is some good change!

Sometimes I get down and depressed when I see all the need, all the troubles in this world. In fact, there's been so much progress, too! Sure, sometimes it is two steps forward, one step back, but it is still progress.

A couple of weeks ago we held a drag show at our church and sure, there were a few protesters outside, still, we had a wonderful time, a fun time, celebrating life with its many manifestations. What a beautiful thing to allow instead of oppressing, suppressing, and denying another to be who they are.

While I am going to celebrate Gay Pride this month, I am still looking forward to not needing Gay Pride. I am looking forward to the day when no one will bat an eye at another human being regardless of who they love, how they dress, or which gender they identify with. That day shall be the result of a series of really good changes. The ones I want to work for, the ones Unitarian Universalists have long worked for and will keep striving for till the work is done.

May our touch bring about good, life-giving changes. Everything we touch changes and everything we change changes us. May it be good. May it be so.

WIDENING THE CIRCLE

As we approach the end of the church year, the Sunday Services Committee shares this reflection of the past year. Our theme for this year was "Widening The Circle" which reflected our congregation's adoption and commitment to the UUA's proposed 8th Principle. During August of last year, we had a month of services focused on Preparation for our theme. Rev. Gy challenged us with two services; "Are You Willing?" and "Have Courage". We again welcomed our friend Rev. Larry Farris to explore "Curiosity" and Miriam Epskamp walked us through what she learned at GA about the Article II Study Commission.

In September we focused on Theology and with Rev. Gy's thoughts on "Bad Theology Makes for Bad Ecology" and then our annual Water Communion. We also heard from Cameron Young about "Adaptive Ministry" and member David Senecal's reflections on Stoicism.

While exploring "Wellness" in October, Chris Dilley shared how the Kalamazoo Food Coop is moving towards a deeper understanding of organizational change. Linda Cypret-Kilborune shared a perspective from the native American community. We ended the month with peace activist and musician Jim Scott.

November focused on Community with Rev. Harold Beu considering trends in society focused on harmful illusions rather than truth seeking. And Miriam, assisted by Nick Tasko and Amanda Nelson shared information on our annual "Guest at Your Table" program and a Bread communion.

During the holiday month we explored the theme of Hospitality with a message from local black farmer Chaz Rawls and again, we enjoyed the lovely winter solstice service from UUCC members and friends.

January started the New Year in consideration of living our values. Rev. Gy started the new year with our "Burning Bowl" and "Letter to Self" services. Rev. Dr. Megan Foley asked us to embrace a more active congregation and consider what may be next for Unitarian Universalism. Ebony Peace then reflected on change as a spiritual practice as we discuss revisions to our UU principles. We ended the month with five members and friends sharing how they personally live the values that provide meaning in their lives.

Liberation was our theme in February. Rev. Gy asked us "what does it take to live a truly authentic life while allowing others to do the same". Then a UUCC anti-racism study group shared their individual thoughts on our dismantling structural racism. Friend Dorothy Brooks shared an inspiring story of her experience as a white teacher on a Navajo reservation. Dorothy also exhibited her photography that captured aspects of her time on the reservation. Robert Weir encouraged us to identify our gifts and have the courage to utilize them while living peacefully in service to others.

In March we looked at restoration and reparations as part of our year of Widening the Circle. Rev. Gy started the month of a Stewardship theme looking at how to nourish what we already have to invest in a bountiful return. They also asked us to work together making UUCC place that supports a variety of beliefs and realize the message of Unitarian Universalism that we can do together what

we cannot do apart. Levi Rickert, of Native News Online, talked about the bleak history of native boarding schools and its disastrous generational impact on native culture. Rev. Gy followed up with a reflection on how we may repair the damage caused to BIPOC communities from systemic racism in America.

In April, our theme investigated Innovation and Risk-Taking. Rev. Gy asked us to see how striving for perfection is keeping us from living a fulfilling life and they envisioned Easter as a time to heal and renew our planet. Michael Wilder shared how his life in a gang was turned around through forgiveness, reconciliation, and education. Michael inspirational story became the documentary "Peace During War" and is supporting at-risk youth in our community. Shane Barrera, a.k.a. Miss Moscato, shared their experience embracing their inner queen and the importance of drag shows.

May was dedicated to the theme of Accountability. Rev. Gy was in the pulpit the entire month. "Living In Right Relationship", "Hindsight is 20/20?", "100 Years of Flower Communion" and "Where is the Line" were their titles. Each week provided thoughtful words to consider.

Looking forward to our "Celebration" month in June, we'll hear from Miriam Epskamp, DRE, and David Senecal about the relationship between Ralph Waldo Emerson and Margaret Fuller. We will proudly welcome back Jacquis Robertson, our former DRE and we will end the month with a service from the UUA's General Assembly.

The Sunday Services committee is proud of the diversity of services we were once again able to provide while staying within our allotted budget. We try to continually improve the experience both for those physically in the sanctuary and virtually at home.

Following our committee's commitment to allowing for knowledge transfer and a well-deserved respite we are thankful for the work of Regena Nelson and Kimberly Ridley as they end their time on the committee. And are happy to welcome new members Nicky Leigh and returning member Pat Fuehr to next year's committee.

For those of you who may not know, five times a year UUCC holds a special collection to support non-profit organizations whose work aligns with our values. One of those recipients is always the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC). They partner with organizations around the world doing disaster relief work and supporting human rights. We have participated in the UUSC Guest at Your Table Program for many years. The other four recipient organizations are nominated by congregants and voted on by the Program Council. In the past we have supported groups like Planned Parenthood, First Day Shoe Fund, Face Off Theatre, OutFront Kalamazoo, Kalamazoo Climate Crisis Coalition, Ecumenical Senior Center, and others.

To get a head start on the voting process, we will be collecting your nominations for Generosity Sunday recipients by email during the months of June and July. Your summer assignment is to spend some time thinking about organizations you have a relationship with, whose work aligns with our Unitarian Universalist values, and that would benefit from a few extra dollars.

Everyone was understandably disappointed. The good news is that Eric, Regena, and Miriam were able to save many of the native plants before the road crews began work. They relocated them on the north side of the property.

Many people in the group have been busy planting flowers and vegetables in their yards. Did you know that small scale, backyard gardening that uses techniques that build and protect healthy soil can actually help sequester carbon from the atmosphere and store it in the ground?



Gardening for the climate is something everyone can do, whether you are limited to a sunny windowsill or you happen to own several acres in Cass County. <u>Green America</u> has some great tips on practices to help you get started.

Composting is one of the practices that is recommended to build soil health. The Sustainability Group is very interested in supporting a community composting project at UUCC and look forward to learning more about it in the coming months.

In place of their regular meeting this month, the Sustainability Group plans to attend the Thoughtful Tuesday gathering with Carol Higgins on June 13 to learn more about the Climate Reality Project.

PRIDE



In June of 1969, patrons and supporters of the Stonewall Inn in New York City, led by trans and gender non-conforming people of color, staged an uprising to resist the police harassment and persecution of the LGBTQ+ community. We celebrate LGBTQ+ Pride each June to honor those who resisted and to celebrate the many identities and experiences of self that make up the human family.

UUCC's commitment to LGBTQ+ inclusion and empowerment doesn't just happen in June. It is something we support all year round because we believe that Love is Love. Check out some of the things we did this year to make our values real:

Observances:

- The kids in RE learned about the history of **Coming Out Day** and made a bulletin board to share upstairs.
- We shared information about **Trans Day of Remembrance in** newsletters, announcements, social media and emails. The kids in RE heard the story *I am Jazz* about a young trans person and made trans pride pins for people to add to their name tags. The youth learned the history of the Day of Remembrance and made a bulletin board with pictures and stories of trans folks who lost their lives this year just for being who they are.
- On **World AIDS Day** the kids raised awareness by making ornaments with facts about AIDS and using them to decorate a Christmas Tree they display ed in the Community Room
- For **Trans Day of Visibility,** we asked folks to write words of encouragement to the trans community and then took photos of them holding up their words. We put the photos together into a video which we shared on social media and during a Sunday service.
- The kids in RE learned the history of **National Day of Silence** and some shocking statistics about LGBTQ+ youth experiences with bullying in school. They made a bulletin board to display upstairs to share what they learned with the adults in the congregation.
- For International Day Against Homophobia, Biphobia, and Transphobia (IDAHOBIT) the kids in RE talked about bullying and made a banner of pink triangles to hang in the church window. We posted a photo of it on social media on IDAHOBIT (May 17).

Adult Education:

- Seven UUCC folks participated in the UUA on-demand webinar Speaking Up for Trans Lives
- Sixteen UUCC folks attended a zoom call with the Tracy Hall, Executive Director of OutFront Kalamazoo to talk about their areas of concern for LGBTQ+ equity and justice in our community and in the state and how we as individuals and as a faith community can support the work that OutFront is doing.

Sunday Services:

• We will celebrate **Pride Sunday** on June 18. Rev. Gy and our youth member, Nick Tasko will work together to present this service.

Projects:

- We held a **Drag Workshop and Show** to show our commitment to LGBTQ+ visibility and acceptance.
- We raised money for **OutFront Kalamazoo's Legacy House** that provides support and shelter for LGBTQ+ young adults who are experiencing homelessness.
- We will partner with Peoples Church to staff a Unitarian Universalist table at **Outfront Kalamazoo's Pride** event at Arcadia Festival Site on Saturday, June 3 from 12-6 PM



R.E.flections From <u>Miriam Epskamp</u>, Director of Religious Education We had a Drag Show! And what a Drag Show it was!

The turnout exceeded our expectations by a long shot. I had set out about 60 chairs set out for the event but a half an hour before start time, people began pouring in through our doors and I knew were going to need more. All sorts of people started lending a hand, some I knew and many I didn't. We brought out stack after stack of chairs from the back room. I estimate there were around 140 people in attendance.

And do you know what? So many of them were young folks—teenagers, college students, and young adults. It was a joy for me to see. Some of them came because they were curious about drag. Some came to show support for the LGBTQ+ community. And some just came to have fun.

And from where I was standing at the back of the sanctuary, it seemed like people were having a good time There was laughter; there was cheering. It was a celebration and it felt good.

Of course, this isn't the part of the story that was shared by the media. They wrote about the protesters, the counter protesters, and the arrests. I am sure that some of you might feel that the notoriety we gained from this event does not reflect well upon UUCC. My feeling is that we should proud for having the courage to stand up for our beliefs. The statement that Rev. Gy, Eric, and I (with help from Eric's sister Deb) wrote about the event sums things up pretty well:

Unitarian Universalist Community Church is an inclusive and affirming community. Our denomination has been on the forefront of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, and Queer equality for more than 50 years. Our recent Drag Me to Church event was held in alignment to our values and principles.

We are grateful to Miss Moscato, Gretta Vendetta, Savannah Hawthorne, and Nomi D'shire for putting on such a joyful show and for answering everyone's questions about drag with such honesty and good humor. We are grateful to the many UUCC volunteers who helped make the event possible and to the staff of OutFront Kalamazoo and to the Unitarian Universalist Association for all their assistance. We are grateful to the members of the community who came out to enjoy the show and who gave generously to our collection for Legacy House, which provides shelter and support for LGBTQ+ youth ages 18-24, who are navigating homelessness in Kalamazoo County. We are especially grateful to members of the Portage Public Safety Department and other members of law enforcement whose presence kept everyone safe.

We will not let the politicization of diversity that is occurring today alter the course of our mission and vision – of who we are as a community. We will continue, with love and compassion, to support safety and justice for the LGBTQ community.
