Spiritual Theme for October CONTEMPLATING SENESCENCE

Our next stop on our exploration of the Tree of Life is senescence, the cycle of life and death.

Trees, especially deciduous ones, are often associated with the cycle of death and miraculous rebirth because of their annual habit of dropping their leaves in the fall then and re-growing them in the spring. There could be no stronger symbol in the natural world of life, death, and life again.

Unitarian Universalist views about life after death are informed by both science and spiritual traditions. Some of us live with the assumption that life does not continue after death, and others hold it as an open question, wondering if our minds will have any awareness when our bodies are no longer living.


The one thing we know for sure is that we cannot escape the cycle of senescence. We are becoming, changing, aging, and eventually, we will die.

Our special guest for the next **Thoughtful Thursday** on **October 19** at 7:00 PM will be **Dr. Donald Rothberg**, one of the nation's foremost leaders in socially engaged spirituality. His experience uniquely combines a long record of activism and organizing, extensive teaching, and leadership roles in pioneering programs that weave together social action with spirituality. He has practiced Buddhist meditation for over 25 years and has been significantly influenced by other spiritual traditions, particularly Jewish, Christian, and indigenous.

Dr. Rothberg teaches retreats and groups on Buddhist insight meditation practice, lovingkindness, and other heart practices, transforming the judgmental mind, mindful communication, working skillfully with differences and conflicts, and socially engaged Buddhism. He is a member of the Teachers Council at Spirit Rock Center, a guiding teacher for the Marin Sangha in San Rafael, California, and a regular teacher at the East Bay Meditation Center in Oakland, California, Southern Dharma Retreat Center in North Carolina, InsightLA, and New York Insight. He has practiced insight meditation since 1976, and has also received training in Tibetan Dzogchen practice, body-based psychotherapy, and trauma work. He has helped guide many six-month to two-year training programs in socially engaged spirituality, both Buddhist-based and interfaith, and is the author of *The Engaged Spiritual Life: A Buddhist Approach to Transforming Ourselves and the World*, and the co-editor of *Ken Wilber in Dialogue*.

On October 19, Dr. Rothberg will speak with us about the connection between opening to change, loss, and what is painful, and opening to wisdom, compassion, and skillful responses to our lives and the world.

FROM THE MINISTER



As Rev. Gy continues to recover from surgery they will take a break from their monthly column and give us an opportunity to hear perspectives from other ministers. This month's reflection is from a May 2023 <u>Braver/Wiser</u> blog post from **the Rev. Tania Yadira Márquez** (she/ella), an ordained UU minister, Spiritual Director, and Hospital Chaplain

> Is it that we come in vain to live, to sprout over the earth? Let us leave at least flowers, let us leave at least songs. —Nezahualcóyotl

I have been working as a hospital chaplain for almost two years now. During this time, I've had the honor to accompany people as they say goodbye to their loved ones, and have prayed numerous times by the deathbed of a person. At their deathbed, patients are often wondering if their life was worth living, if their lives had meaning.

This work has made me more aware of our mortality and of the ways in which humans connect and care for one another. One of the things I have noticed is that many of the encounters I have with patients turn into poems, the most available means of expression for the emotions I felt.

My Nahua ancestors thought about death a lot. The little literature that survived the conquest tells us about how they wondered about what life was, what it meant to be alive, and how they often concluded that life on earth was but a dream. They also thought that the greatest mystery of life could only be captured in song and poetry—*flor y canto*, as they called it.

This capacity to bear witness to the world, to life and death, and turn those experiences into flower and song is an ability we all possess. It is about letting the voice within speak in its own language; to not be limited by the structures we perceive but to attempt to reach beyond. To be open to another way of perceiving the world and, perhaps, to be open to new ways of understanding death, too.

To create beauty amidst the suffering and chaos of our world is what Nezahualcóyotl is exhorting us to do: that when we become fully aware of our limited time on earth we can still, at least, leave behind flowers and songs.

Our hearts and spirits already know how to express themselves; we just have to open up our hearts and let both *flor y canto* spring forth in song, in poetry, in actions that help make the world more beautiful; that help reveal deeper truths; that help us connect to the source of life.

RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION



R.E.flections From Miriam Epskamp, Director of Religious Education For the last year or two, the Unitarian Universalists world has been engaged in revising Article II of the Bylaws of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). Article II is where our core UU values are articulated. It is the covenant to which all of our congregations pledge themselves when they become members of the UUA. The seven principles spelled out in Article II are central to our understanding of what it means to Unitarian Universalists.

As you can imagine, the process to revise Article II has been long, cumbersome, frustrating, and not without conflict. We have debated, argued, and disagreed. But, it has also been a gift for Unitarian Universalists of all ages, from all over the world, and all walks of life to engage

in deep theological discernment together. If not for the revision process, that probably would not have taken place. The invitation to think deeply about what is important and true to us is so valuable. Whatever the outcome, the process of taking time to review, rethink, and re-see our principles and purposes has made Unitarian Universalism stronger.

I think our recent discussions about re-naming our congregation have created similar opportunities for UUCC. Our meetings about name change have allowed us to talk with each other about what we value about UUCC, about our core identity as a spiritual community, and how we want others in the world to see us. We have been given the opportunity to learn from each other and to cherish diverse perspectives. Even if we decide in the end to stick with our current name or something very similar, the process of thinking about it and talking about it has been time well spent.

Sometimes we get so caught up in the destination that we forget the journey is just as important.

There is another unexpected gift that has come out of the Article II revisions that I want to share with you. If you have been following along with developments you might remember that the new Article II proposal included a diagram with love in the center surrounded by six core UU valuesjustice, equity, pluralism, interdependence, generosity, and transformation. It did not take very long for people who work with children in our congregations to start brainstorming how they would teach these new Article II values to young folks. And it wasn't too long after that that someone noticed you can come up with some memorable anagrams using the first letter of each of those words.

I know you are dying to hear more. It is my pleasure to introduce a new UU mascot to you, J. PIGLET. (I am told that JET PIG also works but it is missing "L for Love" and to my mind, Love is the most important part).

Part of me hopes that the discussions and debates about Article II that will take place before we take a final vote next June won't upset this wonderful anagram. (Ideas for pig-themed activities are already filling my head!) But I trust that however things turnout, there will be new things to learn along the way. And that is a gift. May it be so.

Each year UU Community Church engages in "Practices of Welcome" in order to ensure that LGBTQ+ folks feel fully welcomed, centered, and embraced by our congregation and to renew our "Welcoming" certification through the Unitarian Universalist Association.

These practices include exploring issues of importance to the LGBTQ+ community during a Sunday service, honoring days of remembrance and visibility, financially supporting an event or organization, and offering an annual opportunity for the congregation to participate in one or more Welcoming Congregation continuing education programs.

One of the educational opportunities we have chosen for this year's **21-Day LGBTQIA+ Equity Challenge.** United Way of South Central Michigan is partnering with OutFront Kalamazoo to offer this challenge as an opportunity for people in our communities to learn, come together, and break down the systems and biases that keep many people from living a flourishing, equitable life.

During the Challenge, participants will receive one email each weekday throughout the month of October with links to videos, articles, podcasts, and more. The Challenge is self-guided and self-paced. Participants can explore as few or as many of the links in each email as they like.

Group members recently shared inspirations, opportunities, and resources to help each other live more gently on the earth:

- **Darby** shared a reflection about her recent trip to Scandinavia and the many **examples of sustainable living** she saw there including robust renewable energy capacity, scores of people using active transportation such as walking and biking, and a culture that seemed to reject excessive consumerism.
- Regena and Eric are exploring replacing the grass in their backyard with help from their neighborhood Native Garden Group: https://encorekalamazoo.com/growing-native/
- Kathryn has adopted a plant-based diet with help from the book *How Not to Die: Discover the Foods Scientifically Proven to Prevent and Reverse Disease* by Michael Gregor, M.D.

The group also discussed possible programs they could sponsor this year to help the congregation and the wider community learn more about sustainable living. Ideas included an Electric Car Show, a Green Appliance Fair, and a solar panel demonstration. They also plan to continue working on the Green Sanctuary Congregational Assessment to gain accreditation from the Unitarian Universalist Association.

If you cannot make it to either collection site you can always bring your clean, dry items to UUCC and place them in the collection bin by the Welcome table. Our great volunteers Ron and Nancy Crowell and Stephanie Grathwol will make sure your items get delivered to the collection site!

Composting at UUCC

The UUCC compost bin is open for business! The bin is located on the east side of the building, next to the stairs. You can drop off compost at any time using these simple instructions.:


- There are two compartments in the bin. Slide the door with the plus symbol (+) away from the compost tumbler to open the bin.
- 2. Empty your kitchen scraps (green material) into the bin and slide the door back.
- The UUCC Compost team will turn the tumbler and add brown materials (leaves, twigs, and unbleached paper) each week to the bin to create a 50/50 balance of green and brown materials to produce compost soil in about 8-24 weeks.

What you can Compost? Fruit and vegetable peels and scraps, eggshells, coffee grounds, and tea bags. Do not compost meat, fish, poultry, rice, or dairy products.

Putting Our 8th UU Principle into Action

Our 8th UU Principle calls on us to engage in individual and communal action to accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in our congregation and society at large. We regularly share insights and resources in the space to help us do this work.

There are many opportunities for individuals to explore anti-racism/anti-oppression and gain cultural competency at their own pace. OnePlace@KPL is a program at the Kalamazoo Public Library that

offers free workshops and trainings to help strengthen non-profits in our community.

One of their programs, Justice at Work by Freedom Lifted, is a self-paced online training for

individuals and groups that goes beyond most of those that focus solely on diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) and invite participants to:

- Explore the relationship between identity and power
- Take a deep look at the history and legacy of oppression in the U.S.
- Learn what resistance and solidarity look like in practice.
- Adopt a shared language when addressing social justice
- Begin or continue creating plans of action that shift culture and develop practices that advance justice in their organization and community.




- Knotty Conversations for Dismantling White Supremacy
