**Pastor Jacqueline Duhart** serves as the Director of Spiritual Care Services at Starr King School for the Ministry, a Unitarian Universalist seminary in Oakland, California.

Pastor Jacqueline is a Queer feminist of African heritage, a mother, a prison abolitionist, a beloved partner, a daughter and a sibling, Minister Emerita of First Unitarian Church of Oakland, a NURTURER, and LOVER of everything that supports life to thrive in joy.

Prior to pursuing a ministerial calling, Pastor Jacqueline spent more than 20 years as a social worker for the U.S. Air Force including time on the ground as a chaplain in Iraq during the first Gulf War.

# FROM THE MINISTER



## From the Minister [Rev. Gy Ludvig-McCartney](#)

I am writing this on May 30, 2024. It is a historic day. For the first time ever in the life of our country, a former president was found guilty on 34 felony charges. Twelve ordinary New Yorkers weighed all the arguments presented through weeks of long trial days and in about 9 hours arrived to a guilty verdict on every single account.

Many of us rejoice that the legal system held in New York and that no one is above the law. Others are reeling and convinced that this was a politically motivated trial rigged from the get-go.

If history at all predicts or points to the future, times like this are ripe for conflict and upheaval. History reveals that revolutions often happened during such upheavals. We can't know what tomorrow holds for us and it is our hope and wish, of course, that peace, justice, and calm minds will prevail.

I think at times like this it behooves us to stand firm on our values and principles. Perhaps it is not coincidence that the work our Unitarian Universalist Association is doing on Article II of its By-Laws have come about at this time. Much is brewing in the collective consciousness and we are all attempting to define where we stand in this fast changing world.

Giuseppe DiLampedusa said in his famous book *The Leopard*, "If we want things to stay as they are, things will have to change".

Things have to change so more and more feel included in our large tent. It is good for us to look at our governing documents and see if they still adequately represent those of us aligned with Unitarian Universalism. To the degree that there is a discrepancy, changes must be made. Hence the work on [Article II](#). Every generation does not need to revamp their belief systems, our generation, however, is called to do just that. It takes courage and so much LOVE.

The General Assembly of Unitarian Universalist Association will meet again soon and we will send two delegates to represent our spiritual community. They will vote on the final version of Article II and they take their responsibility very seriously. They hope to adequately represent the heart and voice of our congregation. We are grateful for their beautiful commitment.

I have an awareness of the gravity of this political moment. I am also sensing my instinct to want to circle the wagon and I think that is precisely the wrong instinct.

I am placing my bet on Love and Inclusivity. I am going to attempt to stay open when I'd really want to close out the world. I think the times that are coming won't be ordinary times. I hope we can meet them with extraordinary LOVE and COMPASSION.

Because "if we want things to stay as they are, things will have to change".

## Voting on Changes to Article II

The UUCC Board of Trustees has chosen two members, **Marsha Laya** and **Dawn Renner**, to serve as our delegates to General Assembly (GA). We are grateful to Marsha and Dawn for committing their time and energy to attending the GA business meetings and casting votes on our behalf.

Some of the most important votes they will cast during GA will be in regard to the **proposed changes to Article II** of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) By-Laws. The UUA has been working on a rewrite of the Article II section of its By-Laws for several years. Click [HERE](#) for an overview of that process.

**Four amendments** to the final draft proposed changes have been submitted by individuals and/or groups and supported by at least 15 UU congregations and will appear on the agenda at GA.



# CLIMATE CHANGE



*UUCC member Nicky Leigh believes Climate Change is an existential threat to life on planet Earth. She works to raise awareness about the problem through the Kalamazoo Climate Crisis Coalition and is active with the Kalamazoo Township Climate Action Planning Committee. In the coming months, she plans to provide UUCC with a series of newsletter articles about Climate Change covering what it is, the possible ramifications, and what can be done. She is also willing to answer any questions our newsletter readers might have.*

## Climate Change - Despair or Hope

In 2006, Al Gore called his documentary “Inconvenient Truth” probably because no one wanted to face the reality of climate change. It was inconvenient to do so. This documentary built on the work of Bill McKibben who had been trying to get people to realize we should never, ever, have more than 350 ppm of carbon equivalents in the atmosphere. We passed that redline in 1989. By the time of “Inconvenient Truth”, not even 20 years later, we were already at 379 ppm. In 1896, Svante Arrhenius, a Swedish scientist predicted that carbon dioxide levels could heat the earth’s atmosphere through a greenhouse effect.

Our scientists have known of the potential problem for 128 years. Do you think we might stop procrastinating and actually face the problem head on?

Rev. Gy recently talked to us about hope. When faced with a problem we “hope” it can be solved. We “hope” things will be better. But hope, like “I’ll pray for you”, needs action. Hope without action is a sentiment not a solution.

For 128 years, we have been hoping that something will happen to make climate change unreal. It’s not happening. Life is good, we don’t need to concern ourselves about what we can’t see. But we are now seeing it. In this country we have droughts, floodings, wildfires, tornados, heat waves, and hurricanes in unprecedented ways. 100 year occurrences are happening every few years. I visited a cave in Missouri that had had two 100 year floods in a 5 year span. Just in Europe, during the heatwave of 2022, approximately 63,000 people died from heat related causes. And this is happening around the world. We hear of massive flooding in India and Pakistan. Deadly mudslides in Afghanistan from excess rain. Wildfires in Siberia and Canada. Heatwaves and droughts in Africa, Mexico and India.

This is a problem which many consider large enough to cause despair. But like hope, despair is a sentiment not a solution. Generally, hope is positive and leads to action, while despair is negative and leads to apathy - it is beyond me to make a difference so why even try.

Despair can be said to be self-defeating. One common reaction is: let’s enjoy life while we have it, throw all precaution to the wind and live our lives to the excess we want. This can really be fun - flying around the world, taking long cruises, buying everything we ever dreamt of wanting. Eat, drink and be merry for tomorrow I may die. We no longer have generational thought or true community. To cover our fears, we become an ostrich with our heads buried in the sand.

But that is not our community. Our community is one of hope and helping. (*More on page 12*)

# SUSTAINABILITY

There are two ways to lower our atmospheric carbon equivalents: mitigation to reduce our emissions to zero and carbon capture and storage to remove it from the atmosphere. The latter requires technological advancements that are currently being worked on.

We hold our 30-Day Sustainability Challenge every year to remind people of individual actions which make a difference. These actions do make a difference. My solar panels have produced about 75% of my household electrical needs and that includes an electric car for the past 5 years.

But one of the biggest individual actions you can take is: become an activist! Write your Congressperson and your State representatives. Join an organization that does lobbying, gets out the vote, or works locally on problems. Join demonstrations, carry posters, vote based on climate matters. Find like minded people, have fun, and be loud.

In 2024, we passed 422 ppm. That means in 35 years we have increased the ppm by 72 ppm and it's still climbing.



# PRIDE



In June of 1969, patrons and supporters of the Stonewall Inn in New York City, led by trans and gender non-conforming people of color, staged an uprising to resist the police harassment and persecution of the LGBTQ+ community. We celebrate LGBTQ+ Pride each June to honor those who resisted and to celebrate the many identities and experiences of self that make up the human family.

UUCC's commitment to LGBTQ+ inclusion and empowerment doesn't just happen in June. It is something we support all year round because we believe that love is love and it is our responsibility to help build a world where people of all sexual orientations and gender identities

feel welcome and supported. Here are some of the things we did this year to make our values real:

## **Observances:**

- We shared social media posts to mark **Coming Out Day** in October, **Transgender Day of Remembrance** in November, **World AIDS Day** in December, **Transgender Day of Visibility** in March, **Day of (NO) Silence** in April, and **International Day Against Homophobia, Biphobia, and Transphobia** in May.
- We also incorporated readings into our Sunday services to raise awareness about these days.

## **Adult Education:**

- We encouraged everyone at UUCC to take part in the **United Way/OutFront Kalamazoo 21-Day LGBTQIA+ Equity Challenge**.
- 12 UUCC folks attended the **LGBTQIA+ Equity Challenge Debrief Session** led by Rev. Gy.

## **Sunday Services:**

- We invited members of the LGBTQIA+ community to share their stories on **Coming Out Sunday** in October.
- Rev. Gy will share a **Pride Sunday** message on June 30.



## **Projects:**

- In November, Rev. Gy and Miriam **spoke out against transphobia** at a Vicksburg School Board meeting.
- In December, we partnered with OutFront Kalamazoo to host a **LGBTQIA+ Elders Pancake Breakfast**.
- We sponsored a hole at the **Queer Disc Golf Tournament-Kalamazoo** held in May.
- Also in May, we hosted a **Drag 101 Workshop** and **All-Ages Drag Show** to show our commitment to LGBTQ+ visibility and acceptance.
- With 4 other progressive churches, we will co-host **Portage's very first Pride Celebration from 12:30 – 3 PM** on June 2 at the Portage United Church of Christ.
- We will staff a table at **Outfront Kalamazoo's Pride** event at Arcadia Festival Site on Saturday, June 8 from 12-6 PM. (If you are interested in volunteering at Pride contact Miriam today!)


