

Love is the power that holds us together and is at the center of our shared values. We are accountable to one another for doing the work of living our shared values through the spiritual discipline of Love.

These words introduce the newly adopted statement of principles and purposes found in Article II of the Unitarian Universalist Association by laws. The idea that Love is at the center of our Unitarian Universalist faith is fairly new concept. Love was not mentioned in our previous principles at all.

But, after surveying and interviewing more than 10,000 Unitarian Universalists about the values that guide their lives, it became clear that Love is central to our faith, our living, and the mission of our congregations. Unitarian Universalists are guided by and centered in our engagement with all that Love requires.

The Rev. Dr. Sofia Betancourt, the current president of the Unitarian Universalist Association says, *Given everything our world faces today, having faith in Love is no small thing*. She believes that our pressing task now is to ask ourselves and each other how this putting Love in the center calls us



forward, individually and collectively. We may agree that Love is central, but what does that mean to us and what does it require of us?

It is in that spirit that the UUCC Sunday Services Committee (Joe Calme, Nicky Leigh, David Senecal, Rev. Gy, and Miriam) has decided to devote this new church year to exploring how we can ground our daily personal and collective choices in Love, how we can become more kinder and compassionate, and how we can create and maintain relationships that support and challenge us as we work to grow into our best selves. From the Minister

If you know me well, you know that I ponder a lot. I like to look at issues closely, from the Moon, I want to discover the moving particles of events, movements and such.

Lately I've been thinking about lofty ideas like idealism, realism, and practical-ism...

My thinking is not well formed yet, but a newsletter deadline is a newsletter deadline, and it appears that I am going to present you with a half-baked idea.

All movements, political or religious, emerge from ideas. If we are lucky, from ideals. Ideals are moonshots, beautiful, powerful aspirations. "*All men are created equal*" – humanity has never lived up to this ideal, but we try when we are at our best. We aspire to bring it close to everyday lived experience.

I do wonder why don't we succeed? Why don't we always succeed? Is there something at the core of us that would have us believe otherwise? – I don't know. Perhaps now I've given you, too, something to ponder about...

Some things do stand in the way, though, I think I have clarity about that. Nothing kills idealism faster than realism. Down-to-earthism. Realism cares about the bottom line, looks at circumstances to determine the possible. And there's a huge price to pay for this down-to-earth way of being. So many beautiful aspirations are sacrificed at the altar of this mediocracy: art, beautiful architecture, kindness, generosity, and most importantly grand ideas.

Realism created city blocks that lack beauty. Sure, the buildings are functional, they do the job, but no beauty, harmony, delight. Realism quickly gives way to good-enough-ism. You find it everywhere, in every aspect of life that received the cold kiss of realism.

What is the antidote then? Obviously, idealism, the inspirer or dreams, giver of grand ideas and ideals! Oh, the thought of it stirs my soul!! Idealism shapes circumstances to bring forth an inspired reality!!

And idealism and realism exist together as ying and yang. Sometimes one is up, the other down, and then it all changes again. It's a constant cycle that we can't seem to resist engaging. Much like darkness and light need each other, how would we even understand one without the other, realism and idealism need each other.

Our Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) has engaged in a phase of idealism. After years of hard work and deliberation we UUs decided to put LOVE at the center of who we are and how we wish to show up in the world. At this year's GA (General Assembly) 80% of the delegates voted to define us in this new way. Love is at the center.

"The UUA's bylaws mandate a regular revision process of this core religious language every fifteen years, and this section of our bylaws has been revised a number of times over the course of the UUA's history. The last wholesale revision took place in 1987 and so much has changed in both our society and our congregations in the interim," said Carey McDonald, the UUA's Executive Vice President. 
A CHOSEN FAITH


I think of this as beautiful and powerful work. I think of this as a worthy aspiration for our existence. I think I wouldn't want to have it any other way.

Book Discussion Group

Once a year, Rev. Gy invites both long-time members and newcomers to this Unitarian Universalist community to join them in a discussion of *A Chosen Faith: An Introduction to Unitarian Universalism.*

In the book, two long-time ministers and denominational leaders, Rev. John A. Buehrens and Rev. Forrest Church, describe the sources and history of Unitarian Universalism, how those traditions are adapted in congregations today, and how they each came to choose Unitarian Universalism as a career and a way of life. It provides a nice framework for participants to talk about their own spiritual journeys and to get to know each other better. We also ask that people who are considering formal membership at UUCC take part in this book discussion group before signing the membership book.

Rev. Gy likes to split the discussion into six, 90-minutes sessions. The discussion group will meet once a week, most likely on Tuesday evenings starting in September or October.

The class will be hybrid both meeting in person at UUCC and on Zoom for those who prefer. Childcare will be provided for anyone who requests it.

CLIMATE CHANGE



UUCC member Nicky Leigh believes Climate Change is an existential threat to life on planet Earth. She works to raise awareness about the problem through the Kalamazoo Climate Crisis Coalition and is active with the Kalamazoo Township Climate Action Planning Committee. In the coming months, she plans to provide UUCC with a series of newsletter articles about Climate Change covering what it is, the possible ramifications, and what can be done. She is also willing to answer any questions our newsletter readers might have.

Climate Crisis - Falling Behind

The US is approximately 40 times the size of the UK. With around 1 million registered battery electric vehicles (BEV) the UK has approximately 65,000 public EV charging stations, while the US with about 3.3 million BEVs has approximately 61,000. The UK is still building them at a rate of close to 21,000 a year. Over the last 3 years, the US averaged 10,667 per year. Another way of looking at it is, the UK has approx. 68 million population vs US 333 million. That means in the UK there is one charging station for every 1046 people and in the US it's one for every 5459. Since lack of charging stations is one of the major reasons people are hesitant about buying BEVs, however you slice it, we are behind. And, this is just one example of what can be done and we are not doing it.

Luxembourg is a tiny country. It's smaller than Rhode Island. Its population is 672,050 while Rhode Island's is 1,070,000. So basically, Luxembourg is one large city with suburbs and some rural land. But what Luxembourg does have is a completely free public transportation system. While it is probably not fair to compare a country with the population of a medium sized city to the US, the question does arise: if they can do it, why can't we. The trains, buses, trams and funiculars are free unless you want a first class ticket or are crossing a country border. The average American car trip is less than 12 miles. According to the Bureau of Transportation Statistics in 2021, 52% of all trips were under 3 miles. If our cities and suburbs had free functional transportation could we significantly reduce the number of cars on the roads. We might even be able to help get this going by not allowing cars into city cores.

From the small to the large. The latest figures I could find were from 2022 but they are still relevant in 2024. If anything they favor China even more. China is the largest GreenHouse Gas producer followed by the United States in second position. But, China produces over 10% of its electricity by renewable sources, and we only produce 6.5% of ours from renewables. The European Environment Agency tracks 30 countries and Ireland produces the least percentage by renewables at 13.11%. Iceland produces over 86% with renewables primarily because of their geothermal capability. All the countries tracked by the EEA get a higher percentage of their electricity from renewable sources than we do. Renewable does not include nuclear. The US gets about 19% from nuclear and France is the highest with about 64%. China only gets about 4.9% from nuclear power.

Transportation and electricity, two of the major producers of GHG's. We are behind, not just other countries, but in our commitment to reduce our GHG's by 2030 and keep the world under a 1.5c increase in average temperature or 2.0c maximum.

CLIMATE CHANGE

This is an election year. Considering the crisis of climate change, maybe, just maybe we should be judging our candidates by their urgency about climate change. If we don't do something about climate change in the near future, we may be too late to have an impact on the lives of our grandchildren.

We need legislation phasing out fossil fuels and encouraging electrification. We need this at all levels of our government. The only way to get this is to vote for candidates who care. So remember to vote in the August primary!



Unitarian Universalists support the use of inclusive democratic processes to make decisions within our congregations, our Association, and society at large. Make your UU values real by participating in nonpartisan "Get Out the Vote" and other votingrelated actions this election season.

Poll Watchers / Election Protection: Serve as a non-partisan poll watcher during the early voting period and/or on election day for the August primary and November general elections. (Training will be provided!)

Phonebanking: Make calls to low-propensity voters to share information about registering to vote, where to vote, how to vote by mail, etc. An automated dialer will be used and your phone number will not be visible to the person being called. (Training will be provided, along with a script to guide the conversation with voters!)

Write postcards: Write and send postcards to people in Michigan jails who are eligible to vote. Postcards and a name/address list will be provided, along with messaging examples. This will start after the August primary.



Tiny Homes for HOPE will be available to people with a history of substance abuse disorder and/or a criminal record. Many of these individuals often struggle to find housing due to discrimination or a lack of credit. People with good jobs are turned down for housing due to a history they're working hard to overcome. Applications will be accepted once the homes are completed.

Let's support HOPE thru Navigation by giving each of these tiny home occupants a handmade quilt! Kathy Hays, Pat Fuehr, and Marsha Laya are organizing a "quilting bee" with the goal of completing three quilts by the end of October. An organizing meeting will be held on August 4 after Sunday Services.
