GUESTS IN OUR PULPIT

We are excited to welcome these guests to our pulpit in September:



UU Community Church member and retired Unitarian Universalist minister **Rev. Harold Beu** was a senior in high school when John F. Kennedy was assassinated. He participated in anti-war protests, including the March on Washington against the Vietnam War. He worked in a poverty-stricken neighborhood in Pittsburgh as part of ViSTA, the domestic version of the Peace Corps. He worked for a time as a high school teacher of history, civics, math, and psychology. Harold went to graduate school in Berkeley and received his MDiv from Starr King School for the Ministry in Oakland. Or-

dained in 1982, he served Unitarian Universalist churches in California, Michigan, and Indiana before retiring a few years ago. Harold actively works for Peace and Justice in our community as a member of Kalamazoo Non-Violent Opponent to War (KNOW) and can frequently be found at one of their vigils for Peace. Harold would like you to know that you are always welcome to join him at these vigils and reminds everyone to, "Keep hope alive!

Jodi Hope Michaels joined Global Ties Kalamazoo as its Executive Director in 2016 following nearly two decades in international community development work, with a focus on human rights and social justice. She previously worked as a director of communications for an international network of local community organizations, as a community organizer for a theatre redevelopment project, and also spent several years working at a large foundation in Jerusalem, among other roles. Hailing from Canada, Jodi has a degree in Human Biology, with a focus on health in the global south, from Stanford University. She has visited some 20 countries, both through her work and general interest in cultural immersion and exchange.





Molly Metchenberg took over the directorship of Hope for Creation, an interfaith coalition focused on climate action for people and the planet, in May of this year. Molly has built relationships within the Kalamazoo community for almost two decades as a co-founder of Peace House, a community in the Eastside neighborhood that supports children and families. She has also worked extensively in the field of Restorative Justice and continues to advocate for alternatives to punitive measures in schools and organizations. She is a life-long nature lover and with Hope for Creation, looks forward to forging new partnerships in Kalamazoo and working toward a

more just and climate resilient community. R.E.flections From Miriam Epskamp, Director of Religious Education I know if you have made it this far into the newsletter you already know about the great UU Climate Justice Revival coming up at the end of the month. Are you excited? I know I am. I love that we are focusing on our ministry for the Earth. I love that our congregation will be doing this work in solidarity with UUs all across the U.S. and Canada. I love that the Revival has given us an opportunity to collaborate more closely with congregations in our region.

I will admit that at first the idea of a 'Revival' gave me a little bit of a pause. Probably thanks to movies and TV, the word evokes a hot, crowded tent and displays of loud and raucous religious fervor complete with shouting, crying, faith healing, and altar calls. My little Unitarian heart recoils a bit at that. Indeed, during the 19th century's Second Great Awakening (whence my tent imagery probably comes) our staid and affluent Unitarian ancestors were firmly in the "formalist" camp that opposed religious revivals.

On our Universalist side, it was a different story. Organized Universalism was actually spread in New England by itinerant revivalists. Many of the early Universalist preachers were circuit riders with little formal education but very well-versed in the Bible. They traveled from town to town gathering disaffected Baptists, Congregationalists, and the unchurched, and then preached sermons and held debates (sometimes for hours on end) that challenged the dominant Calvinist theology of the day. Many of the Universalist preachers were known for their quick wit, clever comebacks, and total disregard for standardized form and ritual.

Rest assured that our UU Climate Justice Revival will not be like either of these scenarios. The materials we have received from the revival organizers are excellent and well-organized. The facilitated discussion on Saturday will be very engaging. There will be opportunities to listen to and share our ideas with other UUs in our region. We will use maps, art, and music to augment our exploration of how the effects of climate change intersect with justice issues in our community. The activities for children and youth have been well thought out and will fun for kids of all ages. We are holding the Saturday program at Peoples Church to accommodate lots of people with lots of different perspectives, but Carol Higgins and I will be part of the facilitating team so you are sure to see at least two familiar faces.

Pat Fuehr, Kathryn Ragains-Wilson, Joe Calme, David Senecal, and Ron Crowell are excited to be presenting the service on Sunday. It will include stories, songs, readings, and ritual that will celebrate of all creation and inspire our stewardship and care.

Regena and Eric Nelson are organizing the Advocacy Hour following the Sunday service to give us an opportunity to reach out beyond our walls with our dream of a just, compassionate, and sustainable future as we engage with voters in our community by writing letters and postcards encouraging them to get to the polls in November.

We will end our Revival with good food and fellowship at our celebratory vegetarian potluck lunch hosted by the Sustainability Group. They are already thinking about delicious meat-free recipes they want to share with you.

A lot of care and effort has gone into planning this event. A lot is being asked of those who attend. But our world is facing an existential climate crisis and NOW is the time for us to come together and act. I hope to see all of you at the UU Climate Justice Revival. Amen and Hallelujah!

CLIMATE CHANGE



UUCC member Nicky Leigh believes Climate Change is an existential threat to life on planet Earth. She works to raise awareness about the problem through the Kalamazoo Climate Crisis Coalition and is active with the Kalamazoo Township Climate Action Planning Committee. In the coming months, she plans to provide UUCC with a series of newsletter articles about Climate Change covering what it is, the possible ramifications, and what can be done. She is also willing to answer any questions our newsletter readers might have.

Climate Change - A Circular Economy

A circular economy is one where a product is designed and manufactured with the manufacturer designing for the end product to be reused or recycled. For instance, plastics with numbers 1 (PET) and 2 (HDPE) are easily recycled, whereas other plastics have varying levels of difficulty to recycle and contain toxins. A circular economy also applies to a consumer. When buying a new product: is it needed, how often will it be used and what will happen to it when it dies or is no longer needed. So the basic essence of a circular economy is: nothing (or very little) should end up in a landfill.

Within our economy, considering the circularity of all items is a seemingly impossible task. I would not even hazard a guess as to how many different items I have in my house, car and yard space! Earlier this year I went to an Electric Vehicle event and I got a swag bag from Nissan. In the bag was a water bottle made from recycled plastic. And a light throw blanket also made from recycled plastic. The bag itself was made from recycled cotton clothing. The paper tags were made from recycled paper. These technologies exist today. The labels claiming to be recycled showed the Forest Stewardship Council (FSC) certification. This is an organization working to preserve forests through charging a carbon fee and paying the landowners to cultivate the forests to be carbon sinks. Whenever possible, buy paper/wood products displaying the FSC logo.

Ikea has committed to be 100% circular by 2030. At this point, over 60% of their products use renewable and recyclable resources such as wood, cotton and wool, as well as over 10% contain recycled products. Some of their stores have a drop off for items no longer wanted. They are then often sold in their reuse store (as-is), or recycled into usable parts. In 2019, 47 million items were given a second life. Both Ikea and Aldi have committed to using recycled plastic for all their plastic wrapping by 2030. Aldi has also reduced its opera-



tional emission by 38% since 2019 and is working with its suppliers to help reduce their emissions.

What about the ultimate consumer circularity? We're born, we die. Oshtemo allows for green Burials—un-embalmed, plain casket or shroud burials. (More on page 10)

CLIMATE ACTION

Except for the manufacturing of the shroud, basically zero carbon emissions, since the decaying body feeds the soil. From dust to dust. Cremation releases over 400kg of carbon dioxide plus mercury and other pollutants. Traditional burials with lined caskets and embalming releases over 700kg of carbon emissions. Both don't sound like much, until you multiply by billions of people.

Many companies are working to reduce carbon emissions, reuse and recycle, and attempting to work into circularity models. They find it saves them money to upgrade to the newest greenest technologies and for the most part it creates customer goodwill, especially if they pass those savings back to the consumer.

Our problem as consumers is to know what companies are actually doing vs greenwashing while doing very little. I don't have an answer to that. We can look for information on their websites, by googling, by reading climate related articles. It really just takes a few minutes. I had been reading an article about why English Cucumbers were wrapped in plastic. In the article it talked about some growers starting to use compostable plastic wrapping and it mentioned a brand Compostic. I looked up Compostic and found out it is certified compostable plastic. As a side trail I looked up "plastic certification" to make sure it's a real thing and not just greenwashing. The whole search was about 5-10 minutes and I now know I can order Compostic products as well as other certified products on Amazon. (By the way, the English Cucumbers are wrapped tightly to retain their moisture and retard spoilage, and we should keep them wrapped in a warmish part of the frig until ready to use.)

If it's a local store you frequent, talk to them. Express your concerns about the climate and environment. Don't be afraid to speak up, it is really the only way they know their customers opinions. Also, talk with your friends and compare notes.

Your decisions today could make a world of difference for our future generations.

PROGRAM COUNCIL SURVEY

At their August meeting (held on July 31) the Board of Trustees decided to spend some time at their September Board Retreat evaluating Program Council to make sure that it is still a good use of our precious time and resources.

End-of-Year Finance Report

We ended the 2023/2024 fiscal year (July – June) with a \$6,542 surplus in the General Fund. This surplus is wonderful because we had budgeted a deficit of (\$4,484) this year (see the chart below).

There are a few things that contributed to this surplus. Our Building Use line item increased due to the rental income received by the Living Church of God. We also received almost \$3,000 more than



budgeted in the Contributions Not Pledged line item. Similarly, we brought in almost \$1,400 more than budgeted in the Fundraiser line item.

The Board has directed that 80% of the surplus, \$5,233, be put in the Property and Maintenance Fund. The other 20%, \$1,309, will remain in the General Fund. This brings our General Fund Balance to \$40,392 (this total is the culmination of all surpluses and deficits since our church began).

Surprisingly, we currently have only one September birthday ... **Julie Kelemen** was born on September 17. Be sure to wish her many happy returns of the day!


In Memoriam:

In May 2016, Fort McMurray, the hub of Canada's oil industry and America's biggest foreign supplier, was overrun by wildfire. Exploring Anti Racism



Each session is a stand-alone conversation. Currently, the group is using questions posed in *Me and White Supremacy* by Layla Saad to guide their discussions. UUCC has been challenged by our justice partners at Interfaith Strategies for Advocacy and Action in the Community (ISAAC) to study this book to help us do the work of dismantling white supremacy culture so we can build a Beloved Community that benefits us all.
