Melanie Hooker has been with the Domestic Violence Coalition of Van Buren County since 2009. In October 2015, she went from victim advocacy to Executive Director. During her tenure with DVC she has added sexual assault services, migrant outreach services with a bilingual advocate, an emergency response team, LGBTQ+ and teen programming, offender programming, and is looking at Human trafficking services. She is a leader for several committees and community partnerships, volunteers for the Victim Service Unit for both Van Buren and Allegan Counties, and recently graduated with a BS in Criminal

Justice which she hopes to use to further help victims of violence.

Frederick Stella was raised in an Italian-American Catholic family in Detroit, Michigan. It was in high school where he was introduced to the Hindu Dharma while taking a course in World Religions. This began a spiritual journey that led him to fully embrace the Dharma at the age of 33. Over these many years Fred has received training in Hindu theology and practice in ashrams and temples in the USA and India. In 2009 Fred was ordained by the West Michigan Hindu Temple as Mandir Pracharak (Outreach Minister). In this role, Fred is quite active appearing at schools, colleges, churches and civic organizations to teach the basics of Hinduism. He also acts as a spiritual counselor and meditation teacher. Since 2015 Fred has



served on the National Leadership Council of the Hindu American Foundation, working in advocacy, education and community relations. Professionally, Fred Stella is a commercial actor. His career has included work in Radio, TV, Film, Stage and Web content. Most of his effort for the past 2 decades has been in the field of narrating and directing audiobooks. He has over 200 to his credit.



Our October Thoughtful Thursday guest, **Libby Slocum**, has had a lifelong interest in spirituality and healing She pursued meditation, nutrition, various bodywork therapies, and then became a Board Certified Acupuncturist. She has shared one-on-one healing sessions for over 35 years. After 30 years of Acupuncture and 40 years of seminars in a wide array of natural healing techniques, Libby has felt a deep calling to share her many healing modalities and technologies, as well as her knowledge and gifts with a broader audience. In 2018, she and her partner Mary Ann Scott purchased 40 beautiful

acres 10 minutes west of Kalamazoo to offer a healing environment in nature, where people could more easily reconnect with their deeper selves. Libby's goal is to empower others by teaching "how to" and sharing the wisdom of those 40 years of experience and amazing healing seminars from around the world. Generosity Giving for October

Periodically UU Community Church holds special "Generosity Sunday" collections to support local organizations that promote justice, equity, and inclusion in our community.



Our Generosity Sunday recipient for October is the Domestic Violence Coalition (DVC) of Van Buren County. Started by two women from Paw Paw in 1996 with hopes of helping those who were abused by their partners, the Domestic Violence Coalition has been providing free services to the residents of Van Buren County affected by the crime of domestic violence for nearly 30 years. In 2004, DVC added sexual assault services to its list of no-cost resources. The mission of the DVC is to provide compassionate assistance to victims of sexual and

domestic violence and to work toward eliminating these crimes in the community.

Domestic violence and abuse are critical problems in our communities occurring every minute of every day, just about every 15 seconds. To help support services and victims in a meaningful way, our goal for this Generosity Giving campaign is \$1000. Donations of any amount are gratefully appreciated but it would only take ten UUCC folks writing a check for \$100 to get us to our goal. If it is yours to do, please consider giving generously.

There are several ways to give to our special collection for DVC:

- You can place a check made out to UUCC with Generosity Sunday the memo in the offering basket anytime in October. You can also mail your check to our building.
- If you prefer to use a debit or credit card, give online using the church website or the Vanco app on your phone. Be sure to choose Generosity Sunday in the menu.
- If you prefer to give cash, we will donate all cash and loose change in the offering plate on October 6 to DVC.

FROM THE MINISTER



From the Minister

Our guest perspective this month comes from the **Rev. Dr. Rebekah Savage**, the Senior Minister at the UU Congregation of Rockville, MD. This essay first appeared in <u>Braver/Wiser</u> in October of 2018.

Die before you die. / موتوا قبل أن تموتوا —regarded by Sufis as a hadith of the Prophet Muhammad

When I first heard of this spiritual teaching from the Sufis, I was miffed. What sense did that make: "Die before you die"? I thought about all of the suffering in the world. A teaching that emphasized more of the loss and grief of death just didn't make sense.

Then I fell in love with someone who made the world come alive. They brought magic and wonder to the way I beheld the world; I believed in myself and the infinite possibilities of a transformative love. They sent me flowers, wrote love poems, and showered me with words of affirmation and adoration. I was so far gone for them.... far, far out there in love.

Die before you die.

What died first was the crumbling of the fantasy they projected into the world of what we could be as a family.

Die before you die.

What died next was their word, their integrity, their cherishing of us.

Die before vou die.

What died next was their respect for my body, for my voice, for my words of patience and acceptance.

Die before you die.

What died next was a layer of my own self-respect and a portion of my heart.

I died again and again over the course of that relationship: little deaths that coated my skin like a burnt coating — a layer of a previous life and dreams — encrusted and enfolded my heart.

Have you ever watched traditional pottery come out of a fire? The clay shape emerges from the flames, buried in burning wood and ash, and the potter has to cool and rub the clay form so that the beauty can emerge. What cooled and rubbed away the burnt coating around my heart was the hard work of spiritual self-reflection, self-care, and good old-fashioned love and acceptance from cherished friends.

Die before you die. What also had to die was my shame and my belief that I was not worthy of such love. These deaths are each precious to me as gifts along the journey — not towards a great love with someone else, but a greater love within myself as a creation of God, worthy of these gifts.



October: Concentrate and Calm Your Mind November: Transform Your Motivation December: Cultivate Emotional Wisdom







- Contemplate our own experience with each source of loss, and what challenges and invitations grief is presenting to us.

CLIMATE CHANGE



UUCC member Nicky Leigh believes Climate Change is an existential threat to life on planet Earth. She works to raise awareness about the problem through the Kalamazoo Climate Crisis Coalition and is active with the Kalamazoo Township Climate Action Planning Committee. In the coming months, she plans to provide UUCC with a series of newsletter articles about Climate Change covering what it is, the possible ramifications, and what can be done. She is also willing to answer any questions our newsletter readers might have.

Climate Change - The Importance of Legislation

According to the EPA's Facility Level Information on Green House Gasses Tool (FLIGHT), in 2022 the four largest non-governmental emissions polluters in Kalamazoo County are Graphic Packaging International (245,837 metric tons), Pharmacia & Upjohn Co. (91,563 MT), Kalamazoo River Generating Plant (71,758 MT), and Western University (65,240 MT). The only one that has significantly reduced their emissions between 2010 and 2022, was Upjohn which went from 135,204 MT to 91,563 MT.

This is an example of why carbon fees are necessary to reduce GHGs. Why should entities spend money reducing GHGs if there is no repercussion when it's not done? After all, aren't companies supposed to work for their shareholders with ever increasing profits, rather than for the public good. In countries where carbon fees have been enacted, businesses have a financial incentive to reduce their emissions because the carbon fee grows year after over and becomes too expensive for the company to ignore, ensuring that they start to reduce their emissions.

Without powerful, enforceable, Federal legislation climate change can and will be ignored until it's possibly too late to mitigate the potential damages. For an example of State legislation, look at Community Solar.

In Kalamazoo we have Consumers Energy. This is a "natural monopoly" regulated by the State. There are a couple of options open to customers wanting to install or use solar panels. First, home owners can install solar panels on their property up to 110% of their annual usage. They sell the generated electricity to Consumers at wholesale pricing and buy back their actual usage at market price. They are now a wholesaler, rather than getting one for one as they used to do. Second, you can pay a monthly fee to buy into one of Consumers "solar gardens" and then pay a set price for your usage. This generally costs more than your standard bill but you are supporting the growth of solar power.

Community Solar would allow a private company to install a small solar farm and sell its electricity to customers. It would tie into Consumers grid, so there still would be a distribution cost on the bill but the total would be less expensive since the price of the electricity is less. (One of the truisms of economics is that monopolies charge more!) Also a number of community solar laws require that a certain percentage of the electricity generated is reserved for low income individuals in order to lower their costs. (More on page 18)

CLIMATE ACTION

Community Solar would also allow people who can't install their own solar panels, for whatever reason, to still be able to use renewable energy without incurring additional costs and at a cost savings.

There is currently a community solar law in the Michigan House and Senate co-sponsored by Democrats and Republicans which can't even make it out of the respective committees even when supported by both parties.

These are just one example of potential legislation. Both the House and Senate bills have been introduced over a number of years but due to lobbying efforts by the fossil fuel and utility companies are stagnant in their respective legislatures.

A couple of additional examples of changes which would need legislation are:

- Make polluters pay for the full extent of their pollution no matter how old the pollution is and start paying into a remediation fund to clean up sites as they're closed;
- Ensure all new buildings should be electric only
- Eliminate use of fossil fuels such as natural gas and propane.

There are a lot more changes which should and could be made if we had legislators concerned about the future.

This is an election year, and we need representatives at all levels of government willing to take the risk and start passing meaningful legislation. Become a Climate Voter! Your vote matters. Your vote is your voice so make sure you are heard both on November 5 and frequently afterwards though letters, texts, and in person meetings with your legislators. Vote and potentially make a difference in our fight for Climate Justice.



R.E.fections From Miriam Epskamp, Director of Religious Education In September, the kids at UUCC learned the story of John Murray and his journey from a fire and brimstone preacher to a Universalist minister who taught that Love is the most important thing. John Murray was converted to a Universalist by a woman in his congregation. Unfortunately, the rest of his flock didn't take kindly to his change of heart and drove him out of the church. My colleague Michelle Richards tells John Murray's story this way:

On or near September 30 of each year, some Unitarian Universalist families and congregations celebrate the arrival of John Murray on the New Jersey shore in 1770—and hence the arrival of Universalism in America. As the story goes: After John Murray's ship became stranded upon a sandbar, Murray and a few other shipmates went ashore to gather some supplies. As part of this quest, Murray met a man named Thomas Potter who invited him and his stranded friends to join his family for dinner.

During the conversation over the meal, it was revealed that Potter had just built a chapel and was looking for a minister to preach in its pulpit. John Murray was a Universalist minister, but after losing his wife and son and being forced out of England for preaching Universalist ideas, he'd pledged never to preach again.

However, Potter asked the reluctant Murray if he would at least preach on the coming Sunday. Murray said his boat would sail out of port by Sunday and so he wouldn't be available. Of course, ships in those days relied upon wind power and the winds would literally have to change in order for his ship to sail. Potter asked him if he would preach on Sunday if his ship hadn't yet sailed, and Murray gave in. "If I'm still here on Sunday," he said, "I will preach."

On Sunday, September 30, the winds had not yet changed and so John Murray did preach a

sermon in Thomas Potter's church. His Universalist message of a loving God who would not damn anyone to hell—the idea of universal salvation—was welcome news in America and soon John Murray found himself preaching regularly again to larger and larger crowds eager to hear his message. He went on to found the Universalist Church in America.

The kids made cork boats and windsocks to celebrate John Murray's miraculous journey and as a reminder not to be rigid in their thinking and beliefs but to be willing to bend with the wind
