Recently Patti and I strangely found ourselves at a wedding at the KIA where we didn't know either of the grooms.

Here's how it happened ...

One of our good friends was invited to this wedding and was asked to bring friends because the family of one of the grooms refused to attend. It was a quick and easy yes for us.

It was a lovely event. Former mayor, Bobby Hopewell officiated and two drag queens made sure fun was had by all.

At one point "our" groom, the one we were there to support, got up to speak. He spoke of the times when he worked at Meijer, long before he was "out". He knew, of course, he knew he was gay, but didn't know any gay people. There was a couple, though, who came shopping every weekend and always checked out the pet food aisle where our groom stacked the shelves. He looked at them longingly, wanting to engage them, but never mustering up the courage.

Then one weekend he decided, this is it! Today he will speak to them. He waited, heart beating fast with anticipation and anxiety. The couple rounded the corner, our groom was face to face with them, and .....said nothing! The couple left and he stood there defeated.

He was beating himself up all afternoon when an unusual thing happened! The couple returned to the pet food aisle!! It never happened before! They'd come once a week and that's that, but on this day they returned and this time our groom found his words!

The couple couldn't have been nicer or kinder. They introduced him to OutFront where Tracy Hall received him kindly. She was the first one to tell him that he's perfect the way he is. Memories brought tears to his eyes—tears of relief and gratitude.

He got involved with OutFront and has played a significant part in helping with establishing housing for the homeless LGTBQ youth.

OutFront had an event at the KIA where he met his now husband. It seemed only right to have the wedding at the KIA.

As I listened to him talk, I felt something stirring inside me. Most of my thoughts have their first appearance in visions. I saw seeds, many, many seeds. Seeds of change. Seeds of kindness. Seeds of compassion. Seeds of justice. Seeds that sprout a world different from the one we now kno, better in so many ways. (More on page 4)

From the ashes of a greedy profit-oriented world there shall emerge a new way. It will be kinder, it will honor life, and it will allow love to lead the way.

It won't be perfect, I don't think anything ever will. It will care to be better, though, and that'll do for a while. Until new seeds emerge, kinder and better yet...




This statement is intended to support your tax records and claims of deductions for charitable giving to UUCC. All receipts made via



For people seeking to begin the year with intention, "Growth to Clarity," will support your journey toward self-care, healing, and growth in the coming year.



January Selection: *The Dictionary of Lost Words* by Pip Williams

From Goodreads:

In 1901, the word 'Bondmaid' was discovered missing from the **Oxford English Dictionary.** This is the story of the girl who stole it.

Esme is born into a world of words. Motherless and irrepressibly curious, she spends her childhood in the 'Scriptorium', a garden shed in Oxford where her father and a team of dedicated lexicographers are collecting words for the very first Oxford English Dictionary. Esme's place is beneath the sorting table, unseen and unheard. One day a slip of paper containing the word 'bondmaid' flutters to the floor. Esme rescues the slip and stashes it in an old wooden case that belongs to her friend, Lizzie, a young servant in the big house. Esme begins to collect other words from the Scriptorium that are misplaced, discarded or have been neglected by the dictionary men. They help her make sense of the world.

Over time, Esme realizes that some words are considered more important than others, and that words and meanings relating to women's experiences often go unrecorded. While she dedicates her life to the **Oxford English Dictionary**, secretly, she begins to collect words for another dictionary: **The Dictionary of Lost Words**.

# CELEBRATE

### Happy Birthday, Betty Lee!

Come to church on **Sunday, January 26** with a potluck dish to celebrate the 99th birthday of our longtime member, **Betty Lee Ongley**!



Born on January 25, 1926, Betty Lee is originally from Algonac, Michigan. She attended Algonac High School where she was the first female sousaphone player in the school band and first woman in the town's marching band! She attended Western Michigan University where she earned a Bachelor of Science in Biology and Social Science in 1947 and a Master's degree in Social Science in 1958. She also received a designation as an Education Specialist, Counseling and Personnel Study in 1974, a Graduate Certificate in Holistic Health in 1984, and a Graduate Certificate in Gerontology in 1991. In addition to

being an exemplary member of UUCC who has served the congregation in many ways, Betty Lee is an activist, community leader, educator, and mentor who became the state's first female mayor when she was elected as Portage's mayor in 1973. She is well known as a community servant who both founded and contributed to a myriad of organizations to make life better for those in Kalamazoo County and the State of Michigan. In the early 1990's she helped co-found the Kalamazoo Russian Cultural Association and its partnership between Kalamazoo and Pushkin, Saint Petersburg, and served as a member of many delegations to Pushkin.

To honor Betty's many city exchange trips to Russia, we would love it if some UUCC cooks could bring dishes in the theme of a **Russian Tea Party** to the potluck after the service on January 26. Not sure what to make? Here are some suggested menu items:
