## FROM THE MINISTER



### From the Minister

Rev. Gy Ludvig-McCartney

How to grow a backbone? Apply pressure!

I am watching the unfolding of this current administration. I've seen this before. Not exactly this, but LIKE this.

This is what authoritarianism looks like. Pretty soon we will learn what it feels like.

The people of this country have experienced tremendous freedoms for so long that no one can even imagine what it is like to have to whisper the truth, hide the forbidden books, secretly attend certain gatherings deemed "revolutionary" by the government, therefore it is hard to believe it as a possibility. Not in this country.

But it can happen in this country. It can happen little by little or like a tsunami. I can see it happening right now.

Strategies of yesterday won't work anymore. We need to come up with new ones.

Courage is what we are called for.

Let me tell you a story:

As you know I am Hungarian. No big deal. Not today. Not in this country, not in this context.

But there was a time in my life when being Hungarian was a very big deal!! It defined every fiber of my being. Do you know why? Because the Romanian government chose to oppress the Hungarian minority. They applied a LOT of pressure on us Hungarians!!

And here's the interesting thing: in the short term it appeared to have worked. In the long term, though, it created very committed Hungarian nationalists!! Under pressure we grew a backbone! A Hungarian backbone!!!

Unintendedly, they strengthened the very thing they wanted to destroy.

Now that I live in this country where no one is oppressing me for being Hungarian, my national identity is no big deal. It is a part of me, of course, but I'm not up in arms about it. No need. I feel perfectly safe being Hungarian. Would that change, however, guess what might become very important to me again??

Something similar is happening here in this country. We relaxed around democratic values and freedoms, because we've taken them for granted. Well, that's changing now. There's a new government in power and they seem to be bent on destroying our democracy.

I think this current government is unintendingly sowing the seeds of a stronger democracy. *(More on page 4)*

(Continued from page 3) We are only now beginning to realize how important these freedoms, values and principles are!

We might be scared now, confused, angry and directionless. Every day many times we are appalled by new executive orders, one more unjust and cruel than the next. But I guarantee you that this is not forever and not for long. This pressure will train our backbone, harden it, turn it into steel. It may take us a minute to re-group, but re-group we shall!

We will defend all the marginalized people who are now targeted, we will protect the environment, and we will reclaim our democracy!!!

We will learn to lean into our trusted communities even more. Together we will do what we cannot do alone!





#### Women's Book Group Friday, February 14 1:00 PM via Zoom

February Selection: *Education for Extinction* by David Wallace Adams

From Goodreads: The last "Indian War" was

fought against Native American children in the dormitories and classrooms of government boarding schools. Only by removing Indian children from their homes for extended periods of time, policymakers reasoned, could white "civilization" take root while childhood memories of "savagism" gradually faded to the point of extinction. In the words of one "Kill the Indian and save the man."

Education for Extinction offers the first comprehensive account of this dispiriting effort. Much more than a study of federal Indian policy, this book vividly details the day-to-day experiences of Indian youth living in a "total institution" designed to reconstruct them both psychologically and culturally. Especially poignant is Adams's description of the ways in which students resisted or accommodated themselves to forced assimilation. Many converted to varying degrees, but others plotted escapes, committed arson, and devised ingenious strategies of passive resistance. Adams also argues that many of those who seemingly cooperated with the system were more than passive players in this drama, that the response of accommodation was not synonymous with cultural surrender. This is especially apparent in his analysis of students who returned to the reservation. He reveals the various ways in which graduates struggled to make sense of their lives and selectively drew upon their school experience in negotiating personal and tribal survival in a world increasingly dominated by white men.

The work of Death Midwives and home funeral guides does not duplicate the work of professionals such as nurses or funeral directors. We work alongside them and our skills are not medically oriented, they are community, spiritually, traditionally, hands and heart-oriented. We use the ancient and time-proven techniques of an open and compassionate heart, touch, and our voices. This work can be done in any setting, whether in a hospital, nursing facility or a home.

In this training you will:

• Learn tools and techniques to midwife the dying.

• Consider family dynamics that occur as someone dies.

• How to determine if a family is a good fit for a home funeral.

• Experience the practice of dying; visioning our own death before we die.

• Learn tools for creating a sacred space for transition, before and after death.

• Legal paperwork required - how to research state laws and build bridges with others presently working in the funeral industry.

• Awareness of the many on-line issues of after death and social networking.

• Will receive certification as a Death Midwife through Earth Traditions.

## Community Solidarity Session 2


# RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION



In January, the kids in RE explored the concept of empathy. They played the **Emotions Game**, giving them an opportunity to reflect on how different experiences made them feel and to share their emotions with others.

During a discussion about the fires in California, they learned that many people lost their homes. They were invited to imagine what they would pack in a "Go Bag" if they had to take their most important possessions with them in an emergency.

They also discovered that there are people in our own community, including children their age, who don't have a place to live. Eager to help, the kids decided to support the **Warming Center at Portage Westminster Presbyterian Church,** which provides our unhoused friends with a warm place to stay on cold winter days. Guests are



served a meal and warm drinks, and they have access to showers and laundry facilities.

Keeping the Warming Center open requires many donations, so the kids created a donation box for UUCC members to contribute. They are hoping YOU will help fill it with essential items such as **washcloths**, **warm socks**, **hand warmers**, **hand cream**, **packaged cookies**, **and sugar**. The center also needs institutional-sized cans of tomato soup, chili, hot chocolate mix, and lemonade mix. Additionally, they are accepting gently used or new men's clothing, including **belts**, **long-sleeved shirts**, **sweatpants**, **and sweatshirts**. Due to limited storage, the Warming Center can only accept the items listed above.


