From the Minister

In a world that often emphasizes conformity and societal expectations, the ability to be our authentic selves is a precious gift, particularly within spiritual communities. Authenticity is not merely about being true to oneself but also about creating spaces where others feel empowered to

express their true identities.

As we prepare for a special Sunday on March 2 to welcome newcomers to our community, it is not lost on me how special it is to be able to be our true selves. We don't have to check our intellect at the door, we can embrace whatever beliefs we have, we can safely ask our most existential questions, we can freely love who we want – all this while we keep LOVE at the center.

As I am writing these words, I am realizing how special this is. I have never experienced it quite to this degree in any other congregation.

Here we encourage each other to explore our own beliefs and values, free from dogma or creed. This exploration is a sacred journey, one that is deeply personal and transformative. By being authentic, we honor our own spiritual paths and inspire others to do the same. In this way, authenticity becomes a beacon of light, guiding us toward a deeper understanding of ourselves and our place in the world.

Being authentic also deepens our connection with one another. Authenticity fosters vulnerability, and vulnerability is the gateway to genuine relationships/friendships. Our mutual vulnerability creates bonds of trust that allows for a safe space where we can overcome our superficial differences and connect at the level of what we share in common. We let Love lead the way.

I know that UUs aren't about proselytizing. We much rather live out our belief system than talk about it with others. And now this is exactly what I am asking you to do. Bring a friend to church. It might feel like proselytizing.

I'd like you to consider another way. Don't you think that in this divided world our way of focusing on what we have in common as opposed to what separates us is exactly what's needed more of? So, don't think of it as proselytizing. Think of it as small gesture to heal the divide.

Please, bring a friend to church the first Sunday in March or any other time that seems right to you. May they find a welcoming, loving, accepting place with us.

UU Community Film Discussion



month from 7-8 PM on Zoom.



Kalamazoo Reading Together Selection: **Solito, A Memoir by Javier Zamora**.

From Goodreads: *Javier Zamora's adventure is a* 3,000-mile journey from

his small town in El Salvador, through Guatemala and Mexico, and across the U.S. border. He will leave behind his beloved aunt and grandparents to reunite with a mother who left four years ago and a father he barely remembers. Traveling alone amid a group of strangers and a "coyote" hired to lead them to safety, Javier expects his trip to last two short weeks. He cannot foresee the perilous boat trips, relentless desert treks, pointed guns, arrests and deceptions that await him; nor can he know that those two weeks will expand into two lifealtering months alongside fellow migrants who will come to encircle him like an unexpected family. A memoir as gripping as it is moving, **Solito** provides an immediate and intimate account not only of a treacherous and nearimpossible journey, but also of the miraculous kindness and love delivered at the most unexpected moments. Solito is Javier Zamora's story, but it's also the story of millions of others who had no choice but to leave home.

RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION



R.E. Flections from Miriam Epskamp, Director of Religious Education

I once had a kid in the Youth Group at UUCC tell me that identifying as a Unitarian Universalist wasn't important to him because our guiding principles were just basic human values and "the kind of stuff everyone believes." Even as I assured him this was sadly not the case, I could understand where he got that idea. Back when this conversation took place he would have heard the message that we should be kind, fair, generous, and compassionate at school, at home, and in films and TV shows. These UU

values were mainstream and the norm. I found myself thinking about that UU kid recently as some very different theological messages came across my social media newsfeed. The first message that caused me to stop in my tracks was, "Empathy is a Sin." I saw this in a tweeted response to Episcopal Bishop Mariann Budde's plea for mercy for those who are vulnerable in a sermon at the National Cathedral on Inauguration Day. The person who tweeted it was a leader of a Calvinist church in Utah. At first, I thought this must be some small, insignificant group akin to the Westboro Baptist Church but a quick Google search led me to scholarly articles, books, and interviews with evangelical pastors and seminary leaders championing the idea. Their argument is that empathy is a sin because it leads to moral relativism and ultimately to the belief the Bible is not the only source of spiritual Truth. As Unitarian Universalists, most of us are nodding our heads in agreement but I can see how evangelical folks would have a problem with it. I can also see how dangerous it could be if this theological outlook becomes "the kind of stuff everyone believes." Further on in the tweet, the young pastor from Utah tells us what the punishment for the sin of empathy should be. He writes, "Do not commit the sin of empathy. This snake [Bishop Budde] is God's enemy and yours too. She hates God and His people. You need to properly hate in response. She is not merely deceived but is a deceiver. Your eye shall not pity." The last line, of course, is a reference to Deuteronomy 19:21— an eye for an eye, a hand for a hand, a life for a life. Kind of chilling, isn't it? I think this seemingly serious, out-in-the-open, theological argument against empathy and in favor of hate makes what we do here at UUCC more important than ever. I think it makes the need for us to talk about our UU values with people outside the church's walls more important than ever. I think it should strengthen our commitment to being proud UUs and spreading the good news of Unitarian Universalism far and wide. I hope you think so too.

I am running out of room so I will have to save the story of a certain elected official's interpretation of *ordo amoris* and what exactly Jesus meant by loving one's neighbor for another day.

The kids in RE had a good time in February thinking about interdependence and how even seemingly small things play an important part in the

health and well-being of the whole. To illustrate this idea, they made paper chains and watched what happened when one link broke. In March, we will explore the UU value of Acceptance (a close cousin of Empathy) as we continue to put Love at the center of all we do.

Visual artists and poets 16 years or older are invited to submit work on the theme:


