A member of Birmingham Unitarian Church since 2001, she has co-led the growth and development of its social justice program and, at present, is VP of its board. She joined the board of the Michigan UU Social Justice Network in 2019 and, after serving as Chair for three years, was appointed its Director. In her professional career, Mary Jo has worked as a program manager and consultant in the private, government, and nonprofit sectors. She is a member of a large family and mentor for two 12-year-old boys. She believes that UUism has much to offer for those seeking community, justice, and exploration of life's questions and can be a catalyst not only to navigate these challenging times, but also to thrive.

The **Reverend Ms. Kim K. Crawford Harvie** was ordained into the Unitarian Universalist ministry in 1984, she spent the following year as an intern at First Parish in Brewster, Massachusetts. In 1985, she was called to the Universalist Meeting House in Provincetown, Massachusetts, where she served until 1989. In 1989, she was called to Arlington Street Church in Boston, Massachusetts, where she served as Senior Minister until 2024.

FROM THE MINISTER



From the Minister

She loves accompanying people on their journeys through life, often bringing along tools of self-compassion to use herself and share with others along the way. Her reflection on the *Possibility of Joy* was originally shared in the UUA's [Brave/Wiser](#) blog in January 2025.

Resistance is the secret of joy. —Alice Walker

The theme of Joy has been reverberating as a holy echo in my life over these past months. Joy feels like one of the most compassionate offerings I can hand over to the depth of my soul which, in many moments on many days, is throbbing with an anger and overwhelm beyond what I can explain. The most obvious explanation is simply that I'm paying attention. Also, maybe, puberty's bookend: menopause.

My clearest observation about the Joy bouncing around inside of me is that she's never by herself—and her unlikely companions surprise me: Sorrow and Suffering. Fear and Fraudulence. Pain and Perseveration. How Joy has the audacity to sidle up to these unlikely characters is beyond me. I'm in awe when she appears like a grace, beyond my own doing. It's a wonder when she arises like a gift, beyond my own deserving.

And, I'm becoming more aware of my own agency in inviting Joy's emergence. As I attune my attention to the reality of the world and my own life, it helps me figure out my intention—the intention that has more to do with the how than the what:

How am I going to show up in my life?

How do I want to live out my values in the process of my own transformation?

How do I hold all of life's complexities while trying to show up as my whole self?

As I deepen my intention, my agency—my power—rises up, showing me the possibilities. One of the possibilities is always Joy. I can choose her. Or not. She's not a bypass of everything in this world that's hard to hold and feel. She is a tool that helps us grapple with their reality. She's like finding something you thought you'd lost forever. She's like a rain falling on parched, cracked ground. She's like the person at a party who approaches you when you're feeling lonely.

I choose her. I can and I do.

The Psalms tell us that “weeping may endure for a night, but joy comes in the morning.” May we be instilled with the desire to search for joy, the intention to find it, and the courage to live it, out loud.

Your summer assignment is to spend some time thinking about organizations you have a relationship with, whose work aligns with our Unitarian Universalist values, and that would benefit from a few extra dollars. At our August meeting, we will finalize our voting and be ready to hold our first special collection in September.

The Sustainability Group has been exploring opportunities to partner with [Hope for Creation](#) on various projects to strengthen our community-based climate action efforts. Hope for Creation—the Southwest Michigan chapter of **Interfaith Power and Light**—is a grassroots, interfaith organization dedicated to promoting faith-based responses to climate change in the greater Kalamazoo area. Examples of successful collaboration include the **Fish for the Future Project**, which urged elected officials to stop the flow of oil through the Straits of Mackinac (our RE program contributed by making 116 origami fish!), and the **Climate Grief Sharing Circles**, which UUCC is hosting on June 1. Members of the Sustainability Group have committed to attending Hope for Creation's monthly planning meetings and look forward to creating more opportunities for UUCC to partner with others in the community in taking meaningful climate action. 8TH PRINCIPLE



Putting Our 8th UU Principle into Action

In 2023, UUCC voted to adopt an 8th UU Principle which calls on us to engage in individual and communal action to accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in our congregation and society at large. Here are some of the ways we acted on the 8th Principle this year:

Education:

- The **Exploring Anti-Racism Group** disbanded due to lack of participation. Ideas about how to continue the group's work were collected at a Program Council meeting, but none have been acted on yet.
- The **Women's Book Group** discussed several books that explored race and racism including *Master Slave Husband Wife: An Epic Journey from Slavery to Freedom* by Ilyon Woo; *Education for Extinction: American Indians and the Boarding School Experience, 1875-1928* by David Wallace Adams; *Solito* by Javier Zamora; *James* by Percival Everett, and *Huckleberry Finn* by Mark Twain.
- The **Civil Conversation Group** hosted a discussion about the **Land Back Movement** with **Jaike Spotted Wolf**.
- 5 UUCC folks participated in a **Community Iftar** to get to know members of the Muslim community in Michigan.

Sunday Services:

Two Sunday services had racial injustice as a central theme:

- Feb 9 - *Albert White: A Beacon of Light at WMU* with **Min. Dr. Karika Parker**
- Feb 16 - *Building the Beloved Community* with **Wendy Fields**

Projects:

- We raised over \$1400 during our **Generosity Sunday** collection for **ISAAC** in support of its mission to build a Beloved Community infused with more justice, equity, abundance, and love.
- The **UUCC Board** donated \$200 from its discretionary fund to **WMU's Lewis Walker Institute for the Study of Race and Ethnic Relations' Youth Juvenile Justice Fellowship**.
- Four UUCC folks attended the November **"Souls to the Polls" ISAAC Public Meeting** during which Miriam shared a reading.
- We supported the **MKB-NAACP Freedom Fund Banquet Fundraiser** by purchasing an ad in the souvenir booklet.
- We hosted the **MKB-NAACP Community Baby Shower Drive** to help combat Black maternal and infant mortality.
- On behalf of UUCC, Miriam attended organizational meetings for the **Justice League of Kalamazoo County**, a faith-based reparations project seeking to repair the breach caused by the historical damage of slavery and its aftermath.

JUNETEENTH

Kalamazoo is offering up many ways to celebrate Juneteenth, the oldest nationally celebrated commemoration of the ending of slavery in the United States and the newest designated federal holiday. Put on your UUCC T-shirt and attend some of these events to show our support!

Kalamazoo Valley Museum

Attend a FREE film screening of the acclaimed **Mr. SOUL!**, a documentary that explores the first nationally broadcast all-Black variety show on public television.

It will be shown Tuesday, **June 17** at 5 PM in the Kalamazoo Valley Museum's Mary Jane Stryker Theater. A panel discussion follows with local Black creatives, curated by Soul Artistry LLC.

The screening is part of the museum's annual **Juneteenth Celebration of Freedom: Black Film Festival**.

The free tickets will be released on the day of the show at the museum's front desk on a first-come, first-served basis.



Kalamazoo Institute of Arts

Join the KIA for Juneteenth Family Afternoon on Thursday, June 19 from 11 AM to 2 PM to remember Juneteenth and the abolishment of slavery in the United States. Participate in various activities, like guided tours of African American artists, drop-in low-mess art activities, and more.

To commemorate Juneteenth and better understand the evolution of our nation and its people, visit [Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Park](#) for an opportunity to reflect upon and learn about African American resilience and achievement as you explore the "Garden of Hope," participate in the self-led tour, reflect on meditative benches, and view the interpretive kiosk.

PRIDE



In June of 1969, patrons and supporters of the Stonewall Inn in New York City, led by trans and gender non-conforming people of color, staged an uprising to resist the police harassment and persecution of the LGBTQ+ community. We celebrate LGBTQ+ Pride each June to honor those who resisted and to celebrate the many identities and experiences of self that make up the human family.

UUCC's commitment to LGBTQ+ inclusion and empowerment doesn't just happen in June. It is something we support all year round because we believe that love is love and it is our responsibility to help build a world where people of all sexual orientations and gender identities feel welcome and supported. Here are some of the things we did this year to make our values real:

Observances:

- We shared social media posts to mark **Coming Out Day** in October, **Transgender Day of Remembrance** in November, **World AIDS Day** in December, **Transgender Day of Visibility** in March, **International Day Against Homophobia, Biphobia, and Transphobia** in May, and **Pride Month** in June.
- We also incorporated readings and visuals into our Sunday services, weekly emails, and newsletter to raise awareness about these days.

Adult Education:

- We encouraged everyone at UUCC to watch the film ***Will & Harper*** to reflect on the power of empathy, acceptance, and trans allyship.
- 8 UUCC folks participated in the **discussion group** about the film.



Sunday Services:

- We invited members of the LGBTQIA+ community to share their stories on **Coming Out Sunday** in October.
- In April, **Heather Sanford from OutFront Kalamazoo** spoke about the religious trauma experienced by some queer folks and the role UUCC can play in advocacy.
- Also in April, **Drag Queens Miss Moscato and Reba Rose Rau** spoke about their journey to drag fabulousness and what acceptance and inclusion meant to them.
- We invited members of the LGBTQIA+ community to share their stories on **IDAHOBIT Sunday** in May.

Projects:

- In January, we hosted an **All-Ages Drag Show** to show our commitment to LGBTQIA+ visibility and acceptance.
- Miriam, our Director of Religious Education shared a reflection and passed out blessings at the **OutFront Faith Alliance's Transgender Day of Visibility Service** in March.
- With several other progressive churches, we will co-host a **Portage Pride Celebration** from 12:30 – 3 PM on June 8 at the Portage United Church of Christ.
- Our Program Council donated \$200 to **OutFront Kalamazoo** in support of its programs and services for youth and adults and their mission to advance social justice and achieve equity & inclusion for the LGBTQIA+ community.


